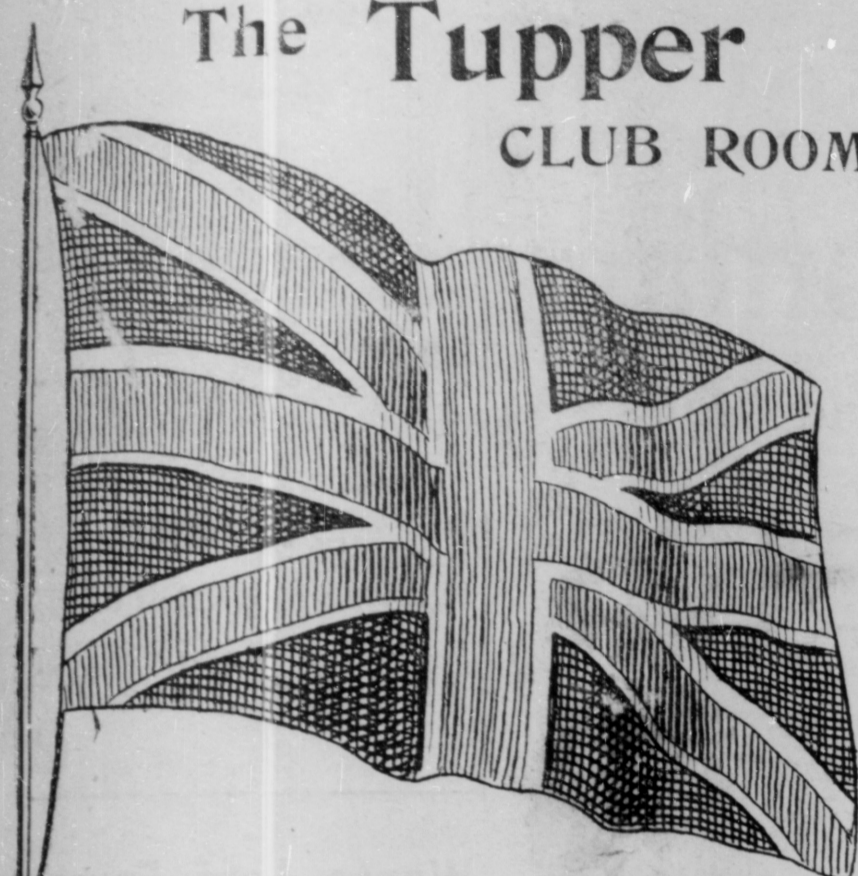

AT NEW GLASGOW

The Meeting Breaks up in Disorder.

The meeting at New Glasgow, last evening, was a large one. Mr. Laird occupied the chair, Mr. Stewart was the first speaker. He was continually interrupted by a few persons who appeared to be primed for the occasion, but he succeeded in making as he does everywhere he speaks—a very favorable impression. Sir Louis Davies followed, speaking for upwards of an hour. He received a good hearing. At the end of his speech, Sir Knight put on his coat and prepared to leave the room. This seems to have been taken for a signal for uproar. A group of electors had evidently pre-determined that no speaker on behalf of Mr. Stewart should be permitted to reply to Sir Louis, and the meeting broke up in disorder. The effect of this disgraceful conduct upon all the decent men present has been favorable to Mr. Stewart, who, we are assured, will make decided gains in New Glasgow as elsewhere.

—According to the report of our telegraphic correspondent who is a particularly careful man—there has been "crooked work" in Victoria, New Brunswick, by which the Government have dishonestly gained a seat.

THE SWEEP OF VICTORY.

Seat in Winnipeg Won by the Liberal-Conservatives.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 2.—The sweep of Conservative victory continues in Winnipeg Centre.

Taylor, the Conservative candidate was elected to the Manitoba legislature yesterday with a majority of 137 over his Grit opponent.

This constituency was held by Liberals continuously for many years by the late member, Colonel McMillan,—from 1880 to the time of his recent appointment to the Lieutenant-Governorship of this province.

This, then, is a notable gain for the Conservatives. But it matters not, these days, whether a constituency has been Grit or Tory in the past. In either or any case the Conservatives sweep of victory takes it in as fast as voters can get to the polls.

Every new event confirms Sir Charles Tupper's estimate of a signal Conservative victory from Ontario to the Pacific.

ANOTHER DEAL

ST. JOHN, N. B., Nov. 2.—Mr. Blair seems to be getting in his fine work.

Medley Richards was nominated to oppose Mr. Costigan, and made a hustings speech.

At night without consulting any of his friends, Richards filed a legal notice of withdrawal, and Mr. Costigan thus gets the seat.

It happened that John Connors arrived in the riding a day or so ago, and left on Wednesday morning after the arrangements were completed.

Richards was believed to be reliable; but he seems to have been in communication with Mr. Blair's emissaries for some days.

There is great indignation in the county as it is claimed that this deal was the only way that Costigan could be elected.
