DISAPPOINTMENT IN THE UNITED STATES.

THAT there is disappointment throughout the length and breadth of Canada need not be stated. The carelessness, waste, extravagance, deceit and tergiversation of the Laurier-Tarte administration have made a deep impression upon all Canadians—and particularly upon those who hoped to have seen an improvement upon the administration of the Conservatives. Nor are we surprised to learn that disappointment with Sir Wilfrid and his Government has extended into the United States. Sir Wilfrid and Sir Richard taught the people of the United States to regard the Conservatives as their enemies and the Liberals as their friends. The Conservatives had stood in the way of the United States. Their fishermen were not permitted to go and come at large in Canadian waters, and their traders were not permitted to make a slaughter market of Canada to the destruction of Canadian industry. So there was discontent in the States with the Government of Canada. Sir Wilfrid went over to Boston with his bland smile and sunny ways and told the people that as soon as the Liberals gained power there would be a change—a great change—by which the people of the States would benefit. It is stated that as a result considerable sums of United States money were sent into Canada for use in the elections on behalf of the Liberals. The Liberals have been in power in Canada for upwards of three years. But the promised concessions have not been made, except in respect to Indian corn, binder twine and a few other articles of little account in the minds of sixty millions. The Liberals are, indeed, just as stiff in their negotiations with Uncle Sam as were the Conservatives. So the people of the United States now say—we quote the Criterion of New York—that "Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Liberal Premier of Canada, has fallen into a trap set for him by his wily opponent, Sir Charles Tupper," and "he has been playing the Tory game." The Criterion continues:

"It was Sir Wilfrid Laurier's hope, on coming into power, that this could be done on a large scale, and at once. He is an optimist and excitable. With an enthusiasm characteristic of the man he set about promoting the Joint High Commission, which was to settle all disputes, and gradually work around to a reciprocity arrangement that would bring Canada into the union commercially, but still keep her Canadian and apart politically. It was a capital mistake so to begin. The increased differences between her government and ours are manifold and vexatious—most of them created by official Canada for vexatious purposes. To have begun frankly with an appeal to our continental fraternity, and asked for a lowering of our tariff in exchange for similar advances, on her part would have been the direct and the safer course. Instead the time of the Commission was frittered over a score of minor issues—all vexatious. It was not felt seriously here that any good could come of it. Unhappily for Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the discoveries of gold in the Klondike lent a sudden prominence to the most vexatious of Canada's contentions, namely, that of the Northwest boundary. Canadian greed was excited. A preposterous tax on gold was at once proposed. Phantoms began once more parading the Canadians. Sir Wilfrid was urged to claim this and that, and to hold fast. A slice of our territory that would give them a Pacific port through waters traversing our Alaskan possession was demanded. In this conjuncture Sir Charles Tupper saw his chance. He would support the ministry to the last grey hair on his head, so they would stand up for what would vex us most. No matter that Canada never had any more use for, need of, or claim upon this cold spot on the map than

it had of any other spot in Alaska, Sir Charles would egg Sir Wilfrid on. Hence Sir Wilfrid, losing sight of his main object, allowed himself his remarkable declaration that it was "arbitration or war," Pyramid Harbor or fight. Back of him shouts Sir Charles Tupper: "Yes, you are right. I will support you. Your language is not too strong. Just hear mine." Ah, he will annoy the Yankees. He has projects of law that will make us truly uncomfortable. It is the old game. Create a situation impossible for a Premier whose watchword was conciliation, and so bring back the Tories to power. And Sir Wilfrid Laurier is in the trap."

We have no doubt that this is a fair expression of opinion in the States concerning Sir Wilfrid and the position held by the Government of Canada in the recent negotiations. The opinion is all wrong as a matter of fact. Sir Charles Tupper would never have placed Canada in the difficult position in which she has been placed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. That Sir Charles Tupper has generously extended a hand to help the country out of the international difficulty into which it has been drawn, shows, not that he set a trap for Sir Wilfrid, but that he loves Canada more than he hates the Liberals. It is essential to the interests of Canada that the people of Canada should present a united front against the pretensions of the States in regard to the Alaskan boundary and so Sir Charles stands by Sir Wilfrid at this juncture. This is one of the reasons why the people of the United States are disappointed.

FAVORITISM.

THE Hon. Peter McNutt called his new schooner "Sir Louis Davies;" and the steamer Stanley left to day for Malpique via East Point. It costs the country dearly; but the two public men privately interested are satisfied. Why not send the steam dredge where she can do the most good for the greatest number,—say to Pownal Bay or Wood Islands where she has long been needed?

Ottawa Free Press: "Peace has always been the dream of the wise, war the experience of humanity. And so it seems likely to continue."

Co-operative Farmer: "We are glad to see that Senator Ferguson is pressing for the establishment of a system for gathering the agricultural statistics of the Dominion. There is probably no civilized country where less is done in this regard than in Canada. We hope before another year that a system may be inaugurated."

DIFFERENCE IN PRICE.—Farmers in the United States, like those in Canada, complain that there is too much difference between the price they receive for an article and the price paid for the same article by the consumer. In the United States the Government has taken the matter up, and the Department of Agriculture there is conducting an investigation for the purpose of learning how much the difference all round is, and with a view of ultimately finding a remedy for any evil that may exist.
