RITE-WAY

Strange But True

The Arnsed Ice Cave in the state of Oregon is one of the strangest spots in the United States. Why? Because this natural oddity—a strange Desert Ice Cave—lies in the area of an ancient lava flow with the hot desert all about it.

The city of Bend got its ice from this cave in the days before refrigerators were invented. No one has yet explored this underground river of ice, and this mysterious phenomenon is quite a puzzle.

In the wilderness section of British Columbia is a mine called the "Mine of Death" though its original name, Lost Creek Mine is more familiar to prospectors and those who seek the yellow metal. This lost mine which has claimed the lives of its 20th victim, Alfred Gaspou, was first discovered by an Indian in 1890. The discovery made the Indian a wealthy man. It also made him an eight-time murderer. He died on the gallows in 1892, after confessing that he took an Indian woman with him each time he visited the mine—then murdered her to keep the place secret.

A score of men are said to have vanished in the mountains while searching for the lost mine. No wonder people refer to the place as the mine of death.

The fates played a strange trick on Jack Cahen, British bookie. While on a motor trip to France, a tire on his car blew out. His chauffeur was killed and Cahen and his wife and 4-year-old son also received injuries. When Cahen recovered consciousness a nurse bent over him and said: "You have won \$28,000 first prize in the Victoria Club's Grand National Sweepstake."

Philosophers of the past tell us that the average person does not do any real thinking of his own until he has reached the average age of 33. Previous to this he has merely parroted the things he had been taught and heard.

He does not take a philosopher's opinion to sum up what the average person's cue to thinking is in this generation. We parrot just about everything we hear and let George do our thinking for us.

The net result of this copycatting is that few people do any real thinking for themselves. Is it any wonder that peoples and nations pattern their analytical thinking after a formula?

Human sacrifices for the crops was widespread in ancient times. Addressing the earth the people said, "O God, we offer this human sacrifice to you; give us good crops, seasons, and health." Then addressing the victim they said, "We sacrifice you according to custom, and no sin rests with us."

The victim was then anointed with oil and each person present put his finger on the anointed part and wiped the oil on his own head. In some places the victim was led from door to door where some plucked hair from his head. As the victim might not be bound the bones of his legs and arms were broken. The mode of putting him to death varied in different countries. One of the commonest modes was squeezing to death. But sometimes he was cut up alive. Another way of sacrifice was to fasten the victim to the trunk of an elephant, which revolved on a post, and as it went round, the crowd cut the flesh from the victim while life remained. Some were burned on a slow fire. The slower he burned and the more tears he shed the more abundant would be the rainfall and the better would be the crops.

The ashes of the victim were scattered over the fields. After the suppression of the human sacrifices animals took their place. In carrying out this awesome custom, some Indian tribes ate the flesh of the victims believing that in so doing they were partaking of the body of their gods.

In colonial days the people used spider webs to stem the flow of blood over the open wounds. I have heard on good authority that
