THE public debt of Europe was divided as follows in 1876:—France, \$4,687,921,400; Prussia, \$229,852,375; Italy, \$2,000,000,000; Russia, \$1,254,810,000; Spain, \$927,000,000; Turkey, \$927,000,000; Great Britain, \$3,884,852,720. These are the heaviest debts, and they bear hardest on Turkey, Italy, Russia and Spain.

THE Washington Bureau of Statistics puts the foreign trade of the United States last year at \$1,156,220,000, or an increase over 1877 of \$24,300,000. In round numbers this increase was made up of \$12,400,000 in exports and \$8,800,000 in imports. The exports exceeded the imports by \$265,000,000, or about \$7,000,000 more than in 1877.

**SECRETARY EVARTS** has sent Capt. Batson, Collector of Gloucester, Mass., to Prince Edward Island for the purpose of obtaining information for the Department regarding the fisheries. **JAMES BRADY** and **Patrick Brady** were, today, charged before **Theoph. DesBrisay, Esq.**, J. P., with assaulting the infant children of the late **Lawrence Morris**. It appears that the Messrs. Brady are the Executors of the estate of the late **Mr. Morris**; and that they, in their official capacity, exercise more than due authority over the children of the deceased—having, at times, assaulted and threatened them. **Patrick Morris** is the guardian of the children, and it was on his complaint the action was taken to-day. The Messrs. Brady were ordered to enter good and sufficient securities, for \$200 each, to keep the act and be of good behaviour towards **Patrick Morris** and the heirs of the late **Lawrence Morris**. Ju.

**CARDINAL BONAPARTE** wishes earnestly to persuade the ex-Empress **Eugene** to leave England, go to Rome and retire in a convent, preferring that of the Sacred Heart, in which a member of the family—**Seur Constance Bonaparte**—died lately, after having been Superior of the establishment for many years. The lady was grand-daughter of **Lucien**, brother of **Napoleon I.**, who married **Mlle. Blechamp**, of **Marseilles**. The Cardinal's idea is that the Empress might form in Rome a centre of clerical Bonapartism to oppose the centre of liberal or even radical Bonapartism of **Prince Jerome** in Paris.

**MR. SAMUEL L. CLEMENS** (Mark Twain), who has been living a busy retired life in Paris for the last four months, left Paris last month for Belgium and Holland, en route for England, where he is the expected guest at one of the magnificent country seats. Mr. Clemens will gail with his family for America about the first of September, and immediately on his arrival home will give his attention to the publication of a new book he has written during this last visit to Europe, the illustrations for which have been designed by **Walter F. Brown**, in Paris, under the supervision of the author.

On Wednesday a man named **Wynett Williams**, in crossing in a canoe from the mouth of the **Keswick** to **Sugar Island**, nine miles above **Fredericton**, in company with a lad, 14 years of age, to make hay, was drowned. Nothing was known about the accident until about half an hour after it occurred, when the lad was found on the **Keswick** shore almost insensible. He cannot in any way account for the accident and only remembers the canoe upsetting, a terrible struggle, and after that he is unconscious of what happened till found on the shore.

THE greatest railroad in the world is the **London and Northwestern**, connecting **London** with **Liverpool** and **Manchester**. It has a capital of about \$240,000,000 and an income of about \$35,000,000; owns 1,100 locomotives, and at its great workshops at **Crewe** employs 6,500 workmen. The main line has three and four tracks, and with its branches it has a total length of 2,200 miles. The run between **London** and **Liverpool**, 204 miles, is made by express in four and a half hours.
