The sole possession of second place will be the reward for an Islanders win tonight. The fast-improving Hawks are in third place two points behind the Islanders.

Lamoureux won his argument with Horeck concerning the "twobit" clock in the Moncton Stadium. Saturday night, a Moncton radio man admitted that a new clock was to be installed in the rink.

Coach Lamoureux stated last night that he definitely needed to win tonight. "We have lost three games in a row and I want to break that streak at Horeck's expense," stated Leo.

St. Mary's In 4-2 Victory Over Millionaires

HALIFAX, Dec. 9 — (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's defeated Sydney Millionaires 4-2 Saturday night in a Maritime Major Hockey League game which saw the Saints move into a fifth-place tie with Sydney and end their three-game undefeated streak.

The game was mediocre. It started at a slow tempo, opened up in a rousing second period, then slowed again slightly in a close-checking third period.

The break came after 15 minutes when Ford's close-in shot bounced off Pidsodny's pads and rolled across the goal mouth. MacKenzie guided it into the corner.

Pidsodny played a sensational game as Halifax pounded through a pressure-ridden defence all the way. The Sydney goalie's best showing came in the second when he turned aside 14 shots. Only one scored.

Poor clearing by the Halifax defence before a minute of the first period had enabled the Millionaires to set up the first goal. Birukow was the triggerman with assists going to Fred Hildebrand and Ron Matthews.

It was not until 13 minutes later that Halifax got the goal back. Fred firing it home from a scramble. Thompson was credited with an assist.

In the fast moving second period, the Saints held a big edge but were balked time after time by Pidsodny. Smith shot the locals into a 2-1 lead at the three-minute mark, finishing off a neat three-man passing play with MacArthur and Pearson.

They held off the aggressive Sydney club until 15:13, when Pirie teamed up with Frank Bathgate and Hildebrand to knock the count. Early in the third, Saints had a few good chances that were stopped at Pidsodny's doorstep but when the big break came, they took advantage. The Saints' winning goal at 15:18 opened the game up as Sydney threw on the pressure in an effort to get the equalizer. But Halifax turned in a good defensive display to hold them off.

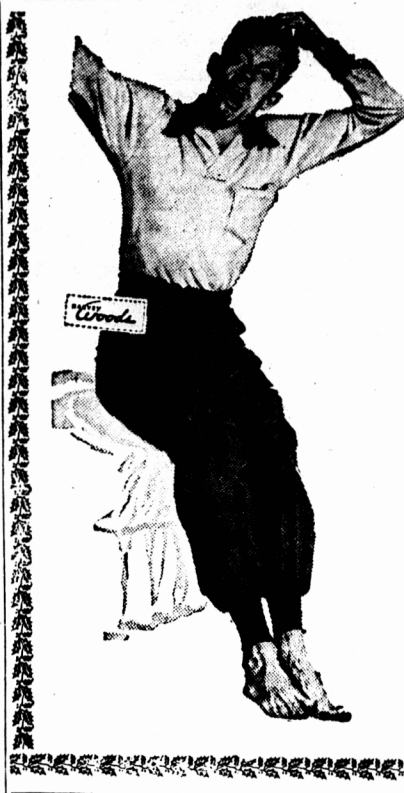

There may even be concessions in international conflicts, sufficiently noteworthy to engender doubts among the West's more shaky allies.
