Montague In 11-7 Victory Over Ch'town

Montague Shmohawks roared to another victory as they defeated the Charlottetown Royals 11-7 in a thrilling fast exhibition hockey game played at Montague last night. The Shmohawks held command throughout most of the game with sustained attack on the defending zone. Tulle was sensational, stopping the locals on many shots labelled for the net. Yet constant pressure told the tale as he was unable to stop them all as the Montague squad rubbered him from all sides.

The visitors were quick to take advantage of opening face offs scoring at 30 seconds in the first and at 46 seconds in the second period. MacKenzie was top scorer for the visitors with four tallies, and Nelson for the locals with seven. However, the full co-operative play of every member of the team, each of whom played first rate hockey, accounted for the hard fought victory.

MONTREAL, Jan. 29 — (CP) — Maurice (The Rocket) Richard fired two goals tonight to lead Montreal Canadiens to a 5-2 victory over New York Rangers and keep the Montrealers on top in the National Hockey League.

Dick Gamble, Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion and Elmer Lach completed the scoring for the Montrealers before a crowd of 14,051. Nick Mickoski and Jack Stoddard scored for Rangers.

Mickoski scored the first goal of the game after only 23 seconds but Canadiens moved into a 2-1 lead by the end of the first period. Stoddard tied it up early in the second but from there on Montreal was pretty well in command, allowing the New Yorker's only seven shots in the middle frame and five in the last.

Continued from page 1. The later stages of negotiations had been holding out for discussions to begin on the basis of a 20-per-cent recommendation of a minority conciliation board report. The 12 per cent is that of a majority conciliation report.

A 40-hour work week for yard workers effective Oct. 1, 1953. This had been one of the ticklish points in the negotiations. Yard employees, about one-third the membership of the 22,000-member BRT, are paid on an hourly basis for a 46-hour week.

No escalator clause in the new contract, as sought by the union, which wanted to hitch wages to any increase in the cost-of-living index.

Changes in operating rules to be subject to further negotiations. The companies originally insisted that changes—which could reduce earnings of employees—be hooked directly to the 12-per-cent wage increase.

Finally, the railway agreed to let them be subject to "further negotiations" without that standing in the way of settlement.

These terms were announced to newspaper men in the Senate railway committee room of Parliament's Centre Block by Donald Gordon, president of the Canadian National Railway, speaking for the group of company-union negotiators.

Prime Minister St. Laurent, who had brought the disputants into new conferences in meetings in his office earlier today, made an almost simultaneous announcement of the settlement in the Commons.

A bit later, after going into the committee room where the negotiators were remaining under klieg lights for CBC's television, Mr. St. Laurent said to reporters: "A bright page has been written in the history of labor relations in Canada."

"Collective bargaining is still a good instrument to deal with labor relations in this democracy." In the Commons, Mr. St. Laurent said he is highly appreciative of the public spirit of those who carried out the negotiations on behalf of the railway and the Brotherhood. They had, he said, fully recognized their responsibilities to the public.

Gordon Graydon (PC-Peel) asked if Mr. St. Laurent could outline the general terms of the settlement. The Prime Minister said he would prefer that to come from those who had reached the settlement.

He added that two points were mentioned to him. One provided for a 12 per cent increase. It would go into force on an "appropriate retroactive date." A 40-hour week would be provided for yardmen starting Oct. 1 next.

There were still divergent views on how the adjustment would be made to the 40-hour week. Both parties asked him personally to select a referee to work out the adjustment. The parties had agreed to abide by the decision of the referee.

The negotiations that ended in the settlement stemmed from a call to the disputants last night from Labor Minister Gregg, asking them to move their stalled talks from Montreal to Ottawa.

Federal building in proportion." (Signed) Mayor B. F. Yeo and Town Council: John A. W. Matheson M.L.A., Minister of Health and Welfare.

After viewing the estimate, \$75,000, for the Federal building at Montague which appeared in yesterday's Guardian, a large delegation of citizens met with the Montague Town Council yesterday afternoon to discuss the building.

It was unofficially learned that a preliminary plan was submitted which gave the Montague building a first floor space of 68 feet by 68 feet. It was designed to include a new Post Office, not a great deal larger than the present one, a Customs Department larger than at present, and the R.C.M.P. department on the second floor.

The site chosen for the new building is directly south of Jamieson's Pharmacy and two properties only. It is learned, may have been purchased, those of Mr. B. N. Hooley and Murdoch MacGowan. The property owned by Henry MacLaren to the rear of the properties has not yet been purchased. It was proposed and understood that the new Federal building would face the main street, and a rear entrance from Rink Street to the building would be provided. It was also understood that the new building would be sufficiently large to give sufficient space in the post office for the present enlarged business, with a view also to further expansion.

It has been learned that Montague has more than doubled its business in the past few years so that it is now the third largest mail volume post office on the Island, exceeded only by Charlottetown and Summerside. It was maintained at the meeting that 900 square feet as provided in the plan would hardly be sufficient, it being the same space allotted to the post office on Grandstone Island which serves a population of 250.

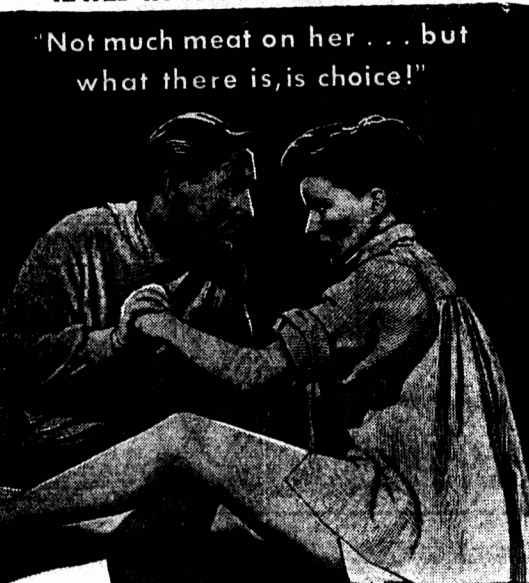
