Huge Quantity Of Western Grain Still Unharvested

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—(CP)—A total of 286,600,000 bushels of prairie wheat, oats, barley and flaxseed remained to be harvested on Dec. 31 last, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.
