## Water, Sewage System Appraisal Presented

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
Representatives of Engineering Service Company of Halifax met with the Public Utilities Commission and town representatives in a public hearing here yesterday. The purpose was to present a report on an inventory and appraisal of the Nova Scotia firm of the town's water and sanitary sewage systems.

Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, chairman of the commission presided and opened the meeting by giving a resume of meetings between the town and the commission dating back to August of 1963 when the town had applied for a water and sewage rate revision.

Representing engineering services were John R. Kaye and Percy Lovatt. Mr. Kaye reviewed the report and provided explanations on the survey which had been conducted over a period extending from March 14, 1964, to January 15 of this year. Mr. Lovatt, who was overseer of a team of men in the field work, testified briefly.

The firm, from its survey, evaluated the original cost of the water system at \$637,788 and a total depreciated cost of \$529,734. The original cost of the town's sewage system was evaluated at \$322,809 with a total depreciated cost of \$284,251.

Upon completion of the reading of the report, Judge Trainor told the hearing that an earnings or rates base is necessary to determine a permanent rate structure and this report provided this basis.

**NEXT STEP**  
The commission chairman stated the next step would be the setting of permanent rates. He questioned Mr. Kaye as to when his firm could proceed on this project and the Halifax engineer answered that it could move ahead as soon as the commission ruled on the report. Judge Trainor said the report would be taken under advisement and a decision would be reached as soon as possible.

Also in attendance at yesterday's meeting were the other two members of the commission, Stewart G. Ives and W. R. Brennan. Joseph A. Brophy, in his capacity as town manager, represented the town. J. C. McKenna, the town engineer, was also in attendance.

Only two representatives of the public were on hand for the meeting, Eldon Hickey and Parker Crockett. Mr. Hickey posed a number of questions to both the representatives of the Halifax firm and to Mr. Brophy.

### POLICE TOLD GET INTO SHAPE

**VANCOUVER (CP)**—"Awful," muttered the disgruntled physical instructor at the 12 policemen before him. The police were a dozen members of the Vancouver force who were given a hint about their physical condition along with last week's pay cheque.

The instructor was Jim Condie of the Young Men's Christian Association whose services were arranged at reduced cost by chief Ralph Booth—who also provided the hint.

The occasion was a Tuesday night session of physical tests designed to get the policemen—an inspector, two sergeants and nine constables—into physical shape.

Condie, after a session in which he said he went easy, said three of the men were in good condition—as is the chief who takes regular exercises at the YMCA.

"But some of my men have been today—any 16-year-old could run away from them."

The chief had told his 700 men flabbiness and aching backs are major health problems in the force and to a large degree could be countered with physical training.

Condie sent the 12 jogging around the 1/2 mile followed this with press-ups and bending exercises and a few more laps.

"Jog until you are breathing normal," he said. "We'll be here all night then," said one gasping officer.

"You've done nothing," Condie told the men. "Most of you are unfit."

**WANT LOWER TAXES**

**Guy Rouleau Plans Holiday Outside Canada**  
**OTTAWA (CP)**—Guy Rouleau, a central figure in the Dorion judicial inquiry who resigned Sunday as chairman of the Liberal parliamentary caucus, said here he is leaving Canada for an extended holiday.

Mr. Rouleau said he has been ordered by his doctor to go away for health reasons. He told a reporter he plans to leave this week for a two-week European tour, then travel south, perhaps to Mexico.

"I'm not exactly sure yet where I'm going," he said. "I just want to go some place where I can't read any more Canadian newspapers."

Mr. Rouleau, whose name crops up frequently in testimony before the Dorion inquiry into the Lucien Rivard extradition case, was interviewed after he watched the flag-raising ceremony on Parliament Hill Monday.

He testified at the inquiry earlier this month that he made representations last summer to obtain bail for Rivard, facing extradition to the United States on charges he was a top man in an international Mafia-linked narcotics smuggling ring.

Pierre Lamontagne, counsel for the U.S. in the extradition case, testified at the inquiry in December that Mr. Rouleau and three ministerial aides applied political pressure on him to help free Rivard.

**Mining Company Earnings Higher**  
**MONTREAL (CP)**—Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. of Canada Ltd. had earnings of \$30,136,000 in 1964 compared to \$29,823,000 the previous year, the company announced in a preliminary report.

Company President W. S. Kirkpatrick said the consolidated earnings represent \$2.39 a share compared with \$1.82 in 1963.

## Production Increases At Crapaud Creamery

A net profit of \$6,900 was realized by the Crapaud Creamery Company for 1964 it was reported by C.M. Lea, company secretary, at the annual meeting held this week in Crapaud.
