

ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION

There is general agreement that artificial insemination possesses a number of distinct advantages over natural breedings. One of the main advantages is that it increases, to an extraordinary degree, the usefulness of superior sires. Progressive breeders like to make full utilization of sires that have proven themselves able to raise desirable characteristics. Proving requires time — a few years in the case of dairy bulls. It is extraordinarily important then that means be available for the most efficient employment of those sires that demonstrate extraordinary talent through their progeny.

Certain genital diseases can be spread among female livestock through natural breedings. Artificial insemination prevents the exposure of a healthy bull to disease and prevents the transfer from cow to cow of these germs that sometimes cause sterility. When artificial breeding clubs are in operation, the danger, both of expense and of keeping a sire can be eliminated. The feed and labour expended on a sire can be spent on an extra cow which, if profitable, will pay for all or a large part of the yearly cost of breeding the herd artificially.

Artificial insemination makes possible the development of large families of superior animals within a particular district. In addition to improving the class of livestock, another result would be attracting of outside buyers.

A. I. MEETING

The Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture has inaugurated a programme for artificial insemination.

A meeting is being held on Friday, April 29th, at Howard's Restaurant, Summerside, commencing at 8:00 p.m., for all cattle breeders who are interested in possibilities of artificial insemination. In order to establish a local unit, it is first necessary to ascertain the breeder interest. This can only be done by conducting a survey in the area. "AS YE SOW"

Now that the roads are drying up and weight restrictions have been eased, it's a good time to think about getting your seed grain cleaned. Your seed cleaner operator will appreciate it if you get in touch with him first. This will allow him to give you better service instead of rushing your seed through on the day you want to do your seeding. Also when figuring out your seed requirements allow at least 25% extra for cleaning — some grain has to be removed along with the weed seeds.
