Pioneer Husbandry In P. E. Island

Cranberries seem to have been a fairly profitable crop 60 years ago. Great quantities grew on Hog, St. Peters, Robinson's Island and at Muddy Creek, Prince County. Here, a man named C. R. Dickey, supplied local markets for 20 years and made large shipments to Montreal and the Mother Country.

But generally the development of fruit growing in those days was slow and unprofitable, because growers could not get good nursery stock. Again, they did not understand horticulture, as most of the immigrants who came to the Province did not come from fruit growing sections of Europe.

We learn from reviewing old records that apples were grown with some success, and in 1889 a trial shipment of 300 barrels went to England where they brought a handsome profit to the growers.

The "Lake Huron", on her maiden voyage from Charlottetown to Liverpool, carried 12 barrels from the orchard of John Newson, Rocky Point. Some months later, the P. E. I. Fruit Growers' Association sent about 100 barrels, the bulk of which came from Senator Ferguson's farm at Marshfield.

Indeed, the future of the apple industry looked promising and many believed that the day was not far distant when the Garden of the Gulf would be producing as many apples as the famous Annapolis Valley.

There were some fairly large orchards in those days. Perhaps the ones owned by F. G. Bouyer, Georgetown, and J. T. Weeks, Alberton, were the biggest. But time has revealed that orcharding on a large scale was not for this Province and today very few worthwhile orchards are to be seen.

However, we have done better with livestock. Some of the best blood from Europe was brought over by the early settlers. This was especially true as regards horses and for many years Island bred horses sold for premium prices.

Many different breeds of cattle were brought here from the Old Country, but only a few breeders like the late Benjamin Heartz made a go of it. Island farmers were all for the horse, caring little about cattle.

The principal raisers of pedigree cattle in those days were Senator Ferguson, who specialized in Galloways; F. G. Bouyer raised Shorthorns; John Richards held to Aberdeens; Senator Yeo preferred Herefords, while Mr. Easton, Royalty, possessed a fine herd of Ayrshires.

Sheep of various breeds pastured almost everywhere, but the death toll among them caused by dogs, gradually led to a decrease in their number until today only a few flocks remain with us.

Oyster culture flourished then as now, but the digging of shells for fertilizer is said to have caused serious damage to the industry. Time was when the aggregate catch reached 40,000 barrels in a single season's fishing.

Looking at the wild game picture, we learn that large quantities of geese, ducks and Brant were killed each year by means of live decoys, especially trained for the purpose. Richmond Bay and the
