MONTREAL, Sept. 28 — (CP) — Air France announced today it will inaugurate trans-Atlantic service between Montreal and Paris Oct. 2. Planes will arrive in Montreal each Tuesday and leave each Thursday.

BELFAST, Northern Ireland, Sept. 28 — (CP) — Sir Cecil Weir, chief executive of the Dollar Exports Board, said today Britain has reached the half-way mark in closing the dollar gap. Sir Cecil did not give figures.

It was announced last week by the Dominion Government Department of Public Works that a 12 foot wide extension will be built on the west side of the Railway Wharf. This new work will extend from the shore out along the west side to a point near to the north end of the Potato Warehouse. Traffic by truck on the wharf follows the west side and at present there is not sufficient room for two vehicles to pass between the rail track and the wharf side. When the new work is completed it will permit traffic to pass and will facilitate the movement of traffic, when cars are being loaded or unloaded on the rail siding.

The County Master in his address made fitting reference to the Late Bro. Geo. E. Docherty, of Pictou, who has passed away during the year after long service in the Order.

The business session was followed by the election and installation of Ernest MacLeod of Flat River, as County Recording Secretary to fill the vacancy left by the sudden passing of Bro. Geo. E. Docherty.

A delicious lunch was served while the members enjoyed a social hour.

Local Convention

Mt. Stewart Teachers

The teachers of the surrounding districts assembled at Mt. Stewart on September 18 for their annual local convention. Mr. Warren McQuirk presided as chairman. Miss Mabel O'Brien, Secretary, read the minutes of the last meeting. Mr. McQuirk then read a letter from the P. E. I. Teachers Federation reviewing the work of the Federation for the past year.

The following committees were appointed: Nominating: Miss MacAulay, Theresa Handrahan, Mary MacInnis.

Resolutions: Mrs. Handrahan, Arthur MacNeil.

Press: Sister Clare Theresa, Sister Maria Joseph.

Question Box: Miss Perry, Miss Sinnott.

Mr. MacKenzie, Chief Supervisor of Schools, then introduced Mr. H. B. MacLean, author of the present penmanship manuals, who gave a very fine address and demonstration. His enthusiasm and humour were contagious and the teachers certainly felt that future writing lessons would be made more interesting after seeing following this Doctor O'Meara from the Department of Public Health spoke to the teachers about the need for educating the public in regards to dental hygiene. Among other things the Doctor said that the amount of tooth decay could be reduced by a change of food habits, particularly by a smaller consumption of sugar. The three most important phases of dental care, he said, are, Nutrition, Oral Hygiene, and early treatment.

Mr. MacKenzie spoke about the supplement to the course of studies. He said he was making a plea for more effective work in Language and Composition. Mr. MacKenzie asked the teachers to make clear to the parents the fact that the Government gives a grant that helps to pay the cost of the new texts. The parents would have to pay much more for them than they already do if it were not for this money.

Mr. Cudmore representing the Red Cross, brought greetings to the teachers from Mrs. MacCallum. Mrs. Cudmore stressed the fact that Red Cross is an excellent means for teaching citizenship and promoting international friendship and world peace. She said that the cod liver oil capsules would be available again this year through Red Cross. She also spoke of the need for First Aid instruction in the schools and the fact that teachers might attend a First Aid short course to be held in Charlottetown between Christmas and New Years.

The afternoon session was opened with an inspirational address by the Deputy Minister of Education, Dr. L. W. Shaw. He spoke of the need for training the teachers. Training is necessary for the skilful practice of any pursuit. Formerly the teacher had to learn at the expense of the pupil. Now the young teacher is prepared for her job.

Mr. Doiron, Supervisor, congratulated the teachers on their co-operation in sending in reports. He expressed his regrets that he would no longer be visiting some of the schools that he had formerly visited.

Miss Helen Yeo gave a very interesting demonstration on the teaching of spelling.

Reverend Mr. Mercer discussed the alcoholic problem. He said that alcohol is consumed to answer a need in the body such as, shyness, nervousness, etc. It is necessary then, to develop the body to meet the need, instead of depending on alcohol.

The Question Box followed, the questions being answered by Dr. Shaw and Mr. Doiron.

The following slate of officers was then brought in: President: Warren McQuirk. Vice President: Theresa Rossier. Secretary: Mabel O'Brien. The meeting closed with The King.

The Missions course will be under the leadership of Rev. J. A. Fraser, River Hebert, N. S.; Citizenship, Rev. John Jarvie, Sackville, N. B.; Culture, Rev. Warren Langille, Amherst, N. S.; Fellowship, Rev. J. E. Davidge, Springhill, N. S.; Recreation, Rev. George MacLean, Advocate, N. B.; and Administration, Miss Jean Furay, Saint John, N. B. Workshop presentations on each of these courses will give the delegates an opportunity to do some practical work that will be of value to them in giving Presbytery assistance in their own local area.

The young people will gather at 2:00 p. m. on Saturday, and a banquet is planned for Saturday evening when the special speaker will be Rev. G. W. Bruce of Tatamagouche, N. S., who recently attended the General Council of the United Church of Canada. Sunday's program will include a morning Communion service, and in the afternoon a panel discussion on the recent meeting of National Council Y. P. U. At various times during the week-end sing-songs, periods of worship and fellowship, and other special events will be arranged. Sessions will end before noon on Monday.

Tribute Paid To Former Islander

The following clipping from the "ReXall News", published in Long Beach, California, has been received from Mr. Clifford A. Conrad, a former Islander now residing in Long Beach. The Miss Dunbar formerly resided in Murray River, the family being descendants of the Highland pioneers who arrived here on the brig Polly in 1803. She is a cousin of Lt. Col. F. B. Conrad, of Charlottetown.

"Outstanding and heroic service to her adopted country, as well as to her profession of nursing, is only one of many interesting attributes of Ann Dunbar, Industrial Nurse at Rexall Square. Attractive and efficient, Ann's career is a modern story of travel and adventure at home and in foreign lands.

"Born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, and educated in British Columbia, Ann graduated from Vancouver General Hospital, Vancouver, B. C., and immediately served two and a half years with the Children's Orthopedic Hospital in Seattle, Washington; then went to the Hawaiian Islands for two years private nursing. After this followed service with United Air Lines as Stewardess, and from there to Lockheed as visiting nurse.

"Ann joined the Army Nurses' Corps in January, 1943. Her war service is almost a chronology of the war in the Pacific, which began when she was sent to Australia on a troop transport in October, 1943, to bring casualties from the New Guinea campaign. She was then transferred to the Navy hospital ship "Hope" and sent out to the Philippine Islands' "show" (as service people refer to battle engagements). Thousands of patients were taken to base hospitals at New Guinea and Manus Island. The "Hope" arrived at Subic Bay, Luzon Island, the same day that the paratroopers landed on Corregidor.

"One of her most treasured memories is of meeting Ernie Pyle at Uthill while waiting for the Okinawa campaign to start. During this campaign, patients were taken back to Saipan or Guam base hospitals. Nature added to this 'show' by whipping up four typhoons, two of which were really 'whoppers'.

"After VJ day, there was a month's stay in Wakanoura, Japan. All in all, Ann travelled over 60,000 miles on the "Hope", crossing the equator 28 times, and helped care for 6,881 wounded and sick."
