#### Parties in Germany.

The most noteworthy feature of the present electoral conflict in Germany is the disruption of the old parties and the declarations of independence issued by seceding groups of various strength with which it has been initiated. The disintegration of the Centre is now complete as that of the Centre on which Prince Bismarck once depended as his main stand-by. The Radical party has caught the contagion of the prevailing tendency towards severance and has broken out into two fragments. That which adheres to Herr Richter has joined its fortunes with the South German Populists to form a Radical Populist party, while the moderate wing, which includes such men as Bamberger, Richter, Dr. Barch and Major Hintz has assumed the name of Radical Union. The leading principle in the programme of this last group is fidelity to the traditions of German Liberalism as a domestic policy in conjunction with the advocacy of such measures as will keep Germany strong to face outside foes. This party, whose platform is definitely patriotic, is ably led by men of recognized character who are free from the cranks and eccentricities that risk disaster rather than surrender a hobby. The Free Conservatives are not very remote in views and aspirations from the Moderate Liberals, though their manifesto indicates a middle course between the latter's and that of the extreme Conservatives.

#### Driving Out the Jews.

Darkest Russia, a monthly publication, announces that Russian persecution of the Jews is extending to Poland. It says that 480 families have been expelled from the Ronda Gonszowski district alone. The heads of the families were engaged in trade and possessed more or less real estate, which they were forced to abandon. Some of the expelled families have passed through London on their way either to America or to Cape Town. Most of these people are educated and are well supplied with money. This driving out of the Jews is the outcome of measures that Gen. Gourko initiated months ago.

#### The Nicaraguans at Peace.

The New York Herald's Massaya, Nicaragua, special gives the following as the principal terms of the protocol, under which President Sacasa, and the revolutionists arranged for peace. President Sacasa agreed to deliver the Presidency to Senator Salvador Machado, and this he did on Friday. The new ministry was to take possession on Saturday. Both armies under the agreement would be disbanded and all the expenses of the war incurred by either party will be considered a national debt to be paid out of the public treasury. In the new government the revolutionists will have a majority in the cabinet.

### Making Dynamite

A DANGEROUS OCCUPATION IN WHICH WOMEN ARE ENGAGED

Making dynamite is a strange occupation for women, yet they are largely employed in it in many European communities. The manufacture of dynamite for beneficial use in mining and engineering work, as well as for military purposes, is carried on largely in almost every part of Europe. France has three notable factories: At Abion, near Houlleur, on the Seine estuary, at Paillasses, near Port Vendres, in the south of France, and at Ougny, not far from Moret, in the department of the Seine-et-Marne. These establishments produce yearly over 25,000,000 dynamite cartridges. One of the earliest that were set in operation is that founded in Switzerland twenty years ago by Xavier Bander at the instance of the late Louis Favre, the chief engineer of the St. Gothard Railway tunnel to provide the powerful instrument which modern science has invented for penetrating mountains of granite and hard rocks with a facility and economy of labor that could not have been imagined in former ages. A visit to this factory, at Isleton, at the lower end of the Isenthal, in the vicinity of Fluelen, the port on the Lake Uri, so well-known to many English tourists, is seldom granted without a special recommendation. The mechanical operations do not appear to be complicated, and are mostly performed by Swiss women and girls with the aid of simple machines worked by hand on tables. Dynamite, as most people are aware, is a powder which can be made into cakes, or may be converted into a sticky paste called "explosive gum," or be enveloped in cases of paper or pasteboard or metal to form cartridges, which are commonly used in blasting rocks or mineral ores by inserting them in the holes bored with a drill. As the compressed powder, which, being of an oily consistence, now assumes comparative solidity, issues from a tube or cylinder in the shape of a sausage or macaroni, it is cut by a woman into equal lengths of about three inches. Each piece is then carefully taken up by another woman, who wraps it in oiled cartridge paper, which she fastens, closing both ends and covering it to exclude wet; the tremendous little instrument is now complete. There is also a hand mill for making the paste or "explosive gum" cartridges. This machine emits two solid lengths of the material simultaneously, which are cut up, wrapped and fastened in the cartridge-cases and taken away to be packed in boxes for commercial distribution.

The fabrication of the dynamite stuff itself, also performed at the Isleton factory, is terribly dangerous, but custom and strict rule give the operators a sense of ordinary safety.—New York Journal.

### The Siamese.

SKETCH OF THE PEOPLE WHO MAKE WAR IN EUROPE.

To a European eye the good looks, if they anywhere exist, of both Siamese men and women are irremediably destroyed by the universal use of the betel, which blackens and corrodes the teeth and causes them to protrude, which renders the spittoon an indispensable article of furniture, and is responsible for the great splashes of red saliva that may be seen everywhere adorning the ground, as they have been ejected from the mouths of the passers-by. Like their fellows in Anam, the Siamese women enjoy great freedom and influence. Being of a most mercantile and managing temperament, they become the self-constituted stewardesses, treasurers and hucksters of the home or shop or store. They may be seen by the hundred going to market, each seated alone in her own canoe with her wares spread out before her. The last King kept a body guard of Amazons, with red coats and trousers and small carbines; but the present sovereign has converted them into a species of interior palace police. The national character is docile, indolent, light-hearted, gay.

The Siamese are devoted to the holiday making and ceremonies and processions which accompany the most important anniversaries or incidents of life, death and religion, which cause an infinite amount of money to be squandered and time lost. They love games,—kite flying, a kind of shuttlecock, football and fighting with cocks, crickets, beetles and fish; though it is to be surmised that the main attraction of these pursuits consists in the scope thereby afforded for betting and gambling, which are the cardinal national vices.

A Siamese will stake money on anything; licensed gambling houses exist in his cities, and are a large source of income to the Government, which farms out the monopoly. A royal lottery is extensively patronized in Bangkok. The gambling houses and the pawnshops, which are their corollary, and which are stocked with objects pawned or stolen, are a disgrace to the capital. In some streets every other house is a pawn shop kept by a Chinaman. If oppression of these people were found difficult, at least a great reduction in their numbers might be made, while a substantial revenue would accrue to the crown by the imposition upon them of a heavy tax.—The Fortnightly Review.

Darkest Russia, a monthly publication, announces that Russian persecution of the Jews is extending to Poland. It says that 480 families have been expelled from the Ronda Gonszowski district alone. The heads of the families were engaged in trade and possessed more or less real estate, which they were forced to abandon. Some of the expelled families have passed through London on their way either to America or to Cape Town. Most of these people are educated and are well supplied with money. This driving out of the Jews is the outcome of measures that Gen. Gourko initiated months ago.

### The Nicaraguans at Peace.

The New York Herald's Massaya, Nicaragua, special gives the following as the principal terms of the protocol, under which President Sacasa, and the revolutionists arranged for peace. President Sacasa agreed to deliver the Presidency to Senator Salvador Machado, and this he did on Friday. The new ministry was to take possession on Saturday. Both armies under the agreement would be disbanded and all the expenses of the war incurred by either party will be considered a national debt to be paid out of the public treasury. In the new government the revolutionists will have a majority in the cabinet.
