

# Three Canadians Praised For Roles In London Opera

LONDON (CP)—Three Canadians played leading roles in two sprightly operas that captivated an opening-night audience at Sadler's Wells Theatre Wednesday night and won critical acclaim from newspaper critics Thursday.

Sadler's Wells revived two colorful one-act operas by Maurice Ravel, L'Enfant et les Sorciers (The Child and the Magic Spells) and L'Heure Espagnole (Spanish Hour).

"One would have to go a long way to find a more engaging double bill," comments critic Edward Greenfield of The Guardian.

Baritone Robert Savole of Montreal and tenor Emile Belcourt of Saskatoon team up, in a manner of speaking, as rival paramours of a pretty clock-maker's wife in the comic Spanish Hour.

Shirley Chapman, mezzo-soprano graduate of Vancouver's Theatre under the Stars, plays three busy roles in Child, a fantasy in which furniture, school books, pets, garden birds and insects turn on a mischievous boy who makes a habit of mistreating them.

Savoie, who divides his time between Canadian and European opera stages, appears as a guest star in the five-character Spanish Hour, Belcourt, who has studied and sung in Europe for 14 years, is among half-dozen Canadian members of Sadler's Wells London and touring companies.

Miss Chapman and Miss Andrew, who appeared together in Puccini's Madam Butterfly last month for a March production of Strauss's Die Fledermaus along with compatriot Belcourt.

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# B.C. Publisher Suggests Can. Should Be OAS Member

VICTORIA (CP)—Canada should join the Organization of American States, W. Arthur Irwin, publisher of the Victoria Daily Times, said here.

"I believe our national interest now demands occupancy of that empty OAS chair which we have for so long rejected," he told the Canadian Club of Victoria.

Former Canadian ambassador to Mexico, Guatemala and Brazil and a member of the diplomatic service for 11 years, he said the time is fast approaching when Canada must declare itself unequivocally in favor of joining the OAS.

"Pressure for a definitive answer is growing and the first question basic to any sensible consideration of the subject is how important is Latin America to the world and to Canada?"

"In seeking an answer, we should start with the obvious truth that ours is a revolutionary world characterized by rapid and radical shifts in the global pattern of politics and economic power."

"One consequence of these shifts is that Western Europe, which so long played a dominant role as the prime mover in world history, no longer has exclusive title to this status."

With the rise of Soviet power, the upsurge in Asia and the explosion in Africa, Mr. Irwin said, the Atlantic European community has lost the power it held for centuries.

In these circumstances, formerly secondary areas have assumed a new order of importance in the balance of world forces.

"Latin America now is a vital southern flank of the Atlantic European system, not only by geography, but in physical resources, development potential and population growth relative to the rest of the world."

# Continuation Of CPR Train Is Ruled Against By Board

OTTAWA (CP)—After weighing the needs of the tourist season against deficits and other considerations, the board of transport commissioners has decided against ordering the CPR to operate its Dominion passenger train this summer.

However, a board judgment has left open the question of whether the transcontinental train should be revived in the summer of 1967 to handle centennial-year traffic.

In its original ruling on the Dominion, issued Jan. 7, the regulatory board approved a CPR application to discontinue the Montreal-Vancouver train as a 12-month operation. But it reserved decision on the summer service.

Appeals have been filed with the federal cabinet seeking to reverse the Jan. 7 ruling.

The board's three-member panel split 2-1 on the issue of summer service. Chief Commissioner Rod Kerr wrote the majority judgment with Assistant Chief Commissioner H. H. Griffin concurring.

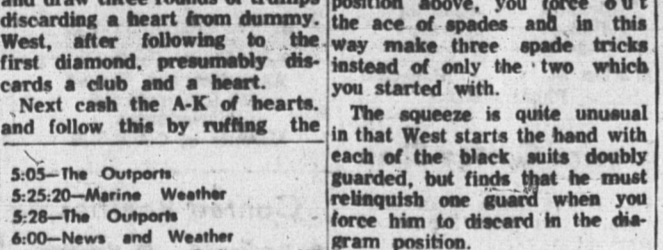
Commissioner J. M. Woodward said in a minority report that the absence of Dominion service this summer will overtax other transportation facilities and result in "much inconvenience, if not a degree of chaos."

Double-dummy problem. South to make six diamonds against the king of clubs lead and any defense.



Opening lead—king of clubs. As usual in double-dummy problems, you are expected to take advantage of seeing all four hands. This does not mean that you will find this problem, composed by West Coast star Edwin Kantar, easy to solve. If you'd like to try finding the solution yourself, stop reading right here.

Win the K of clubs with the ace and draw three rounds of trumps discarding a heart from dummy. West, after following to the first diamond, presumably discards a club and a heart.

Next cash the A-K of hearts, and follow this by ruffing the 5:05—The Outposts
