It was to her mind a question of very great importance and she would like to see it become general. The meeting was, altogether, one of great interest.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER

IMPERIAL FEDERATION.

A Scheme Proposed.

TORONTO, Nov. 15.

The Globe cable says that the special committee appointed by the Council of Imperial Federation League to consider definite proposals for a federation of the self-governing bodies of the British empire have presented an exhaustive report. The committee suggests the appointment of an Imperial Council to give a united voice to the empire in time of peace and enable the defence of the empire in time of war to be undertaken by its united forces and reserves. The Council should consist, it urges, of members appointed by each of the various self-governing colonies; also the British Prime Minister, Secretaries of State for foreign affairs, for war, for the colonies and for India, of the First Lord of the Admiralty and Chancellor of the Exchequer. The method of raising funds at the outset should be left to the choice of the self-governing states; but a uniform principle might afterwards be found and substituted. The committee propose that an Imperial Conference be summoned to consider the question. Such conference, if it is deemed necessary, to be preceded by a Royal Commission. The committee close its report with a strong appeal to the Ministry to take action in this direction.

Clever Elopement.

St. JOHN, Nov. 15.

A young girl of excellent family attending St. Martin's Seminary spent Thanksgiving by her family's request with friends in the city. A son of Mr. Day, Baptist minister of Sheffield, visited her family, and being about to depart for Philadelphia, was accompanied to the station by the young lady and others. When the train was about starting the girl stepped on board and before her friends fairly took in the situation the pair were on their way to the States. At first it was supposed that the young woman had not intended to stay on the cars, but it now appears to be understood that it is a genuine case of elopement.

Sad Warning to Sleepy Boys and Hasty Parents.

St. JOHN, Nov. 15.

A boy in Andover has died under unusual circumstances. He was six years old and hard to awake. His father roused him the other morning by pulling him out of bed by the feet. The lad fell on the floor and immediately expired. On a post-mortem examination the doctor discovered some indications which led him to conclude that the boy died from the effects of the sudden shock.
