Insect Scientists To Visit Maritimes

MONTREAL (CP)—More than 150 insect scientists from other countries left Saturday and Sunday on seven scheduled tours of Canadian insect research laboratories spread from Prince Edward Island to Vancouver Island. The largest group, about 66 including the seven man Russian delegation, will tour laboratories in southwestern Ontario. Ten are bound for the Maritimes, 14 for Western Canada and the remainder split up in collecting or lab trips in Ontario and Quebec.

Luckhurst, director industrial bureau, department of industry and commerce, Manitoba, secretary treasurer.

Russians Display New Jet As Air Unit Quits East Germany

ORANIENBURG, East Germany (AP) — Russia pulled an air division out of Communist East Germany today and in a farewell show gave a surprise display of its new secret jet fighter. Seventy Dushin-28 jet bombers took off presumably for Russia as East Germany's Foreign Minister Lothar Bolz in a big propaganda demonstration de-manded withdrawal of Allied units from West Germany.

More than 10,000 persons at Oranienburg airfield got a peek at the new Soviet jet — a lone silver MIG-19. But only a few spectators realized they were glimpsing the Russian challenge to America's new F-100 jet fighter. The swept-wing, twin-engine MIG sneaked over the airfield as most eyes were riveted on a demonstration of big Soviet troop-carrying helicopters.

NEWS TO ALLIES

Allied air observers said this was the first hint the new fighter may be seeing service at Russia's forward bases in Germany.

LIVING COSTS RISE

WASHINGTON (AP)—The cost of living in the United States jumped seven-tenths of one percent in July for the second successive month, sending consumer prices to a record high and bringing wage boosts to 1,250,000 workers. The increase means that the consumer's dollar has lost more than one penny of purchasing power during the last two months and two cents in the last year.

NEW TRANSMISSION

LOS ANGELES (AP)— Bell Telephone laboratories announced Wednesday night the successful transmission of pictures and sound coast to coast over ordinary telephone wires. The experimental picture-phone already has been used to transmit recognizable pictures over long or short distances, company engineers said. The longest distance was from New York to Los Angeles.

United Farmers Of Ont. Disbands

TORONTO (CP) — The United Farmers of Ontario, a strong farm organization born during the First World War and which for the first four years after the armistice ruled the province, is folding.

It has given notice in the Ontario Gazette that it intends to surrender its charter.

Organized in 1914 as a successor to the Farmers' Association of Ontario, the UFO chose E. C. Drury of Orillia as premier after gaining power in 1919, going down to defeat in 1923 after internal dissension split the party.

The FO enacted Ontario's first legislation fixing minimum wages for women, protection of deserted women, long-term credit and extension of rural electrification.
