Increase Shown In Ferry Traffic Figures

Figures for traffic handled by the Northumberland Ferries on the Wood Island-Caribou service, released last evening, indicate a substantial increase in truck traffic notwithstanding the seven and a half days lost early in the month through navigation difficulties.

A comparative statement with May of last year follows, with 1951 in brackets: Passengers (5,376) 5,269; autos (1,464) 1,288; trucks (651) 728. There were seven fewer passengers and 178 less autos ferried, while truck traffic increased by 131.

It is interesting to note that in 1941, the first year the service was in operation 629 trucks were ferried during the whole season, or 153 less than the month of May this year. Under government restriction, a truck load is limited to 15 tons, for ramp protection, and many trucks of this capacity and slightly less, are now in operation as compared with the half-ton trucks using this route in the earlier years.

The body of John Francis MacIsaac, age 24, was found on the north shore 1 1/2 miles west of Naufrage at 11 a.m. yesterday morning.

During his absence his father thought that he was at the home of his brother, Orrin at Monticello, while his brother thought that he was at home in Greenvale.
