Saved Five From Drowning

Scene Of Accident At Wilmot



The car in the river above is the one from which two adults and three small children were rescued from drowning on Friday evening when it left the highway while travelling east across the bridge at Wilmot on the Summerside-Borden highway about three miles east of Summerside. The accident occurred when Mr. and Mrs. Garden Lawson, and their three children, ages 3, 2 and 2 years, and about 6 months, of Cape Traverse, were crossing the bridge in their 1948 Oldsmobile. Mr. Lawson said the accident occurred so suddenly he was not sure of its cause, but thought it might have been due to a skid on the ice, or the rough approach to the bridge, or a combination of both. The car left the clay road at a point on the bridge where the wooden railing joins the iron railing. It plunged down into the flowing channel water on the north side of the bridge. In a car approaching the bridge at this moment, Elmer and Edwin Hammill, employees of the Summerside branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, were returning to their home in Lower Freetown. As they approached the bridge they did not notice the car ahead of them, but both saw a huge splash of water. When their car reached this spot they could see nothing amidst except that a section of the wooden railing was missing. Although some section of the bridge had been similarly broken they stopped the car to investigate the splash they had seen. Peering over the side of the bridge they could see a car sinking fast in the water beneath them. As it settled it swung slowly in the running tide, and just before the hood disappeared from sight the rear end of the car struck bottom, apparently caught on the edge of the channel. The front end continued to sink deeper. Only the rear window and a small section of the hood was visible above the rising water. Running with all possible speed to the spot where the car went through the railing the Hammill

Have Exciting Afternoon At Burlington

There was plenty of excitement at Warren's Pond, Burlington, on Wednesday, January 28th. Late in the afternoon a heavy tractor load of ice broke through the ice and settled in the water of the pond until very little of it could be seen. The owner, Mr. Roy Tuplin and Mr. Harold Palmer were cutting blocks of ice frozen to a depth of around eight inches, but in the distance of the few feet required for turning the tractor and load, the underflow of water had worn the depth to a mere two inches. A heavy machine was summoned by phone and the tractor and trailer eventually tacked to dry land, a disagreeable task at best, but greatly intensified by the chill of the high wind and blowing snow. By six o'clock all was as usual, but a half hour later much more serious situation had occurred when the mills beside the pond, since 1947, the property of Mr. Daniel Hickox was discovered to be on fire. As the wind had increased in volume, nothing could be saved although a large crowd had gathered, and the loss suffered by Mr. and Mrs. Hickox is serious. To a lesser extent will the loss be felt by his many patrons, accustomed to bringing feed grains to be ground and lumber to be sawn in these mills. It is believed that the fire started upstairs in the grist mill from sparks or overheating from a stove downstairs in which a fire had been lit in the afternoon. Burned with the old grist mill was all the machinery once used for making wheat into flour in that era unknown by later generations, when every farmer sowed two or three acres of wheat which was threshed and part of it made into flour for family use, with the by-products, bran and shorts, fed to livestock or made into brown bread, bannocks, and even shorts porridge for the family. And so another unit in an old time institution has disappeared, leaving behind only a pile of twisted metals, salvaged by the owner with the assistance of willing neighbors, to be sold as junk.

The Educational Horizon

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS OF DAIRY CATTLE
All breeds of dairy cattle show certain general characteristics which distinguish them from the beef breeds. They do not show the breadth, thickness of fleshing, and general rectangular form common to the beef breeds. They are fairly thin and angular, and are not as low set. In general appearance the dairy cow is wedge-shaped when observed from three points of view: (1) from the front, the floor of the chest is wider than the top of the withers; (2) from the side, the distance from the top of the loin to the lower part of the body is greater than the depth of the body at the heart girth; (3) when viewed from the top, the width of the hip bones is greater than the width of the withers.

TRINIDAD VALLEY FORGE

Trinidad was ceded to Great Britain in 1802, lies a few miles off the mouth of the Orinoco. The climate is tropical. The possession of a pitch lake, 114 acres in extent, is the basis of Trinidad's prosperity. The lake has been worked for fifty years, and shows little sign of depletion. The oil wells up from some large subterranean deposit, and hardens upon contact with the air. Trinidad is the largest producer of petroleum within the empire, producing 10,000,000 barrels per annum. Cocoa, sugar, rum, coconuts, molasses are the principal products of the soil. This historic shrine of the American Revolution, notable as the site of the winter encampment of Washington's Continental Army from December 19, 1777 to June 19, 1778, is owned, maintained and preserved by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is administered by the Valley Forge Park Commission. It covers 2,033 acres and includes the major portions of the original encampment. Washington's headquarters is the focal point of the park. Visitors are inspired by original and restored features, including soldiers' huts, field fortifications, hospital hut, bake-ovens, Varnum's quarters, Penn. School and remains of the old forge on Valley Creek. An observation tower affords scenic views.

THE COMMON SCHOOL

The common school is the greatest discovery ever made by man. In two grand, characteristic attributes, it is supremely over all others: first, of its universality for it is conscious enough to receive every child that comes into the world; and second, in the timeliness of the aid it proffers — its early, seasonable supplies of counsel and guidance making security antecedent danger. Other social organizations are curative and remedial; this is a preventive and an antidote; they come to heal diseases and wounds; this, to make the physical and moral frame invulnerable to them. Let the common school be expanded to its capabilities, let it be worked with the end nine-tenths of it is susceptible, and nine-tenths of the crimes in the penal code would become obsolete; the longer catalog of human ills would be abridged; property, life and character held by a stronger tenure; all rational hopes respecting the future brightened.
