An Ecclesiastic's Protest.

DUBLIN, Oct. 1.

Canon Griffin, of County Cork, has written a letter severely condemning the statement made by Timothy Healy, that the renunciation by Balfour of the Catholic University scheme was a bitter blow to those seeking to consolidate the power of England at the Vatican against the Irish Nationalists, and that the leading object of the mission of Monsignor Persico to Ireland was to muzzle the Irish ecclesiastics. Canon Griffin says that Healy's remarks are grossly insulting, and should such language reach the Vatican, it must teach the Pope what to expect if men like Healy ever get in power in Ireland. Canon Griffin declares that it looks very much like a schism in the Church when the Catholics applaud such utterances as those of Healy.

The Cattle Trade.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.

The Deputy of Agriculture has information of the fact of further importation of the disease of pleuro-pneumonia into England, a case having been found recently in a shipment of cattle landed at Liverpool from the North-western States. As a consequence the Department is tightening up its quarantine regulations on the north-west frontier.

Indignant Citizens.

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 1.

Irish citizens of all political factions are in a state of indignation over ex-Mayor Ames' remarks regarding the condition of Ireland, in which he said the country was not ready for home rule and was priest-ridden. Bishop McGoldrick and other equally prominent Catholics have written communications to the press denouncing in vigorous language the utterances of Mr. Ames.

The Fishery Commission.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.

The Fishery Commission who were sent some months ago to Europe by the Dominion Government to enquire into the state of the herring fisheries have concluded their labors and will return to Canada by the steamship Sardinian, leaving Liverpool on 3rd October. They visited England, Scotland and Ireland during their tour of investigation.

A Laborers' League.

DUBLIN, Oct. 1.

The farm laborers in County Clare are indignant at farmers who, they claim, are using the National League for their own profit, while they oppose, in every way, the interests of the laborers, and it was resolved to form a laborers' league and demand the power to elect representatives to the local boards.

Boston Overjoyed.

BOSTON, Oct. 1.

There is unbounded joy in the city tonight over the result of to-day's games, by which Boston once more tops the League. Philadelphia likewise advances, taking third place, Chicago fourth, while Pittsburgh ties Cleveland for fifth place.

Found Guilty.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.

John Fitzpatrick, alias Liverpool Jack, on trial before Judge Cowing, of the general session, charged with kidnapping men and shipping them to the Isthmus, was found guilty to-day and remanded for sentence till Monday.
