

Chicago Hawks May Call For Player Assistance Sun.

DETROIT (CP) — Chicago Black Hawks may call for player help from their farm club for Sunday's third Stanley Cup semi-final game against Detroit Red Wings here.

That was the word Friday from coach Rudy Pilous who says he was "a bit shocked" at news from the Hawks' sick bay in Chicago that indicated three regulars — left wingers Bobby Hull and Ron Murphy and defenseman Al MacNeil — may sit this one out.

Pilous, who left Chicago early Friday, a few hours after the Hawks whipped the Red Wings 5-2 to take a two-game lead in their best-of-seven series said in a telephone interview from Fort Erie, Ont., he "didn't know a thing" about MacNeil's injury diagnosed as two broken ribs.

"MacNeil took his turn on the ice right up to the end of the game and he didn't mention any injury to me."

TO DECIDE TODAY
"We will have a workout

Saturday morning in Chicago and we'll probably make up our minds about help from the farm clubs after I talk to Tommy Ivan (Hawks' general manager)."

"We might have to go to Buffalo for help but I still have Pilous has used these utility men on forward lines since Hawks opened the series with a 5-4 decision Tuesday night.

MacNeil from Sydney, N.S., has shuffled between the American Hockey League's Eastern Professional and the National Hockey League since 1955. Black Hawks picked

him up in the draft from Montreal last summer.

Hull suffered a fractured rim of an orbital bone adjacent to his nose and considerable damage to soft tissue in the nose Thursday night. His face was raked by the stick of Detroit's Bruce MacGregor after a fake by Hull literally sent the Red Wing youngster spinning.

Hull was injured late in the second period after scoring his third goal in two games and skating brilliantly despite an ailing shoulder which was expected to bench him in both Chicago matches.

MAY SIT OUT
Club physician Dr. Myron Tremaine said it is doubtful Hull can play Sunday, even with a protecting face mask. He may see action in Tuesday's fourth game.

MacNeil's broken ribs may also keep him out of Tuesday's game. Dr. Tremaine said.

Murphy, who played last Tuesday night, missed Thursday night's game and may be out a week because of infection which developed on a cut ankle.

Pilous who is a public relations man for The Jockey Club during the off season, was in Fort Erie for a pre-season press conference.

The Red Wings left Chicago Friday afternoon and are staying in Toledo, Ohio. Coach Sid Abel reports they are healthy.
