**McCloskey - Durelle**  
**Bout At Forum Is**  
**Declared No Contest**

A ninth-round fiasco that nearly started full-scale riot, put an end to a scheduled ten-round, non-title welterweight bout between Cobey McCloskey, 164, City, and Yvon Durelle, 159, Bale Ste. Anne, N. B., and turned an otherwise smart boxing card into a disappointment for some 1,000 fans at the Forum last night and was called "no contest" by referee Gus Longaphie.

Losing on points going into the ninth round, according to the scoring of all three judges, McCloskey manhandled Durelle over the ropes midway in the round, took a punch at the referee who tried to break it up, and then went through the ropes after a spectator.

One judge termed the incident "The most disgraceful thing I have ever seen," and another stated "He gave boxing here a bad black-eye."

Durelle was given medical treatment after the bout by a local doctor.

Starting out as a good scrap in the first round when both boys did some smart boxing, indications of a rough bout started in the second round when McCloskey hit Durelle several times on the ropes after the bell had sounded to end the round.

Leading up to the ninth round, both boys showed more signs of roughness when they tussled along the ropes in a wrestling manner on a number of occasions, and things really broke wide-open in the ninth. Taking a decided beating on the exchanges, McCloskey crowded Durelle into the ropes with a body rush that put him right over the ropes onto the apron of the ring outside the ropes. Sitting in that position Durelle indicated that he had been fouled, and when referee Longaphie tried to hold McCloskey off, the latter turned on the referee. Then he jumped through the ropes into the ringside crowd after a spectator.

Allowed to come back into the ring to continue the fight, McCloskey started to rough it up again and referee Longaphie stopped the fight and announced it a "no contest."

his first appearance in a Charlottetown ring, earned a decision over Herb Court of Bedford in a four-round match. Both boys gave with plenty of action all the way and received a big hand from the crowd. In a four-round preliminary, Johnny Russell was the master all the way when he scored a fourth-round T.K.O. over Lloyd Carr. Heavier and smoother than his opponent, Russell moved nicely to outpoint Carr in the first two rounds and gave him a sound going over in the third that nearly put Carr on the mat two or three times. Carr's second wouldn't allow him to answer the bell for the fourth round.

**Chicago White Sox In**  
**10-2 Win Over Boston**

Veteran righthander Randy Gumpert turned in his fourth victory without a loss Tuesday as he pitched the spirited Chicago White Sox to a 10-2 triumph over Boston Red Sox.

The conquest, 18th in their last 20 games, enabled the White Sox to maintain their 3 1-2-game edge in the American League over the runner-up New York Yankees.

The world champions crushed Cleveland Indians 9-2 to halt the Indians' nine-game winning streak.

Gumpert, who won only five games last year, checked the heavy-hitting Red Sox on eight hits. Dom DiMaggio flied Gumpert for three to extend his batting streak to 25 consecutive games.

The White Sox scored all their runs in two innings. They slammed home four runs in the sixth to wipe out a 1-0 deficit and put the game in the bag with six in the eighth.

Gumpert helped his own cause by driving in three runs on a pair of singles. Rookie Jim Busby also drove in three markers on a homer, triple and single.

Allie Reynolds stopped the Yanks' three-game losing skid, limiting the Indians to five hits. The Yanks pounded out 13 safeties, including home runs by Bobby Brown and Yogie Berra.

The Yanks broke up a tight inning with two runs in the seventh inning to take a commanding 4-1 lead. They belted starter and loser Early Wynn for three more in the eighth and picked up their final run in the ninth.

In the only National League day game, the pace-setting Brooklyn Dodgers nipped the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals 3-2. The victory boosted Brooklyn's lead to 4 1-2 games.

Ray Campanella doubled home Carl Furillo from first base in the ninth inning with the winning run.

The Cards enjoyed a 2-0 lead going into the seventh inning when Gil Hodges socked his 18th homer to put the Dodgers back in the game.

Red Mungler blew the lead in the eighth inning. He walked Cal Adams and then tossed Pee Wee Reese's bunt into right field. Adams scored on the error and Reese reached third.

Howie Pollet then took over and stranded Reese as he retired the heart of the Dodger batting order. Duke Snider, Jackie Robinson and Gil Hodges. Pollet walked Furillo to start the ninth and Campanella followed with his game-winning hit.

**Louis To Claim Title**  
**If He Defeats Savold**

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., June 5 (AP) - Joe Louis said today he will claim British recognition as the world heavyweight champion if he defeats Lee Savold in the Polo Grounds on June 13.

"That's the first I ever heard of a heavyweight champion fighting and not having a chance of losing his title," said Louis. "Sure I'll claim it."

Then, slowly, he added: "I'll take it to the U.N."

Savold is recognized as world heavyweight champion by the British Board of Boxing Control. The Board said Monday it wouldn't change that recognition even if Louis defeats Savold.

Louis also said he expects to fight Ezzard Charles, generally regarded as the world champion, probably in Detroit in September, if he gets past Savold.

If Louis whips Savold he may accept a German offer to fight Hein Ten Hoff at Berlin on Aug. 8 for promoter Fred Kersch. He received the offer yesterday, but won't decide until after the Savold bout.

Louis, weighing less than 210, apparently is in the best shape since he started his comeback.

LONDON, June 5 (AP) - Argentina's rugged Cesar Brian won a bloody decision over Jack Gardner, Britain's heavyweight king, tonight but two other British champions felled American opponents before 50,000 fans at White City Stadium.

Don Cockell, British and European light-heavyweight champion, knocked out Nick Barone of Syracuse, N. Y., in 2:50 of the sixth round in the second of the three 10-round non-title fights.

Then Randolph Turpin, British and European middleweight king, dropped Jackie Keough of Cleveland in 2:20 of the seventh round.
