Predict Hail As Curse To Farmers On Way Out

CALGARY (CP)—A hail suppression company official predicts that hail will be eliminated soon as a curse to farmers. The prediction was made by W. Lloyd McSorley, manager of Water Resources Development Corporation Modification Limited. WRDC, with head office in Denver, Colo., and originally set up to seed clouds, had a hail-suppression contract this year covering approximately 750,000 acres in central Alberta. Company officials say that for the third consecutive year of the firm's operations no wide or long track of hail damage swept through the project. Alex Munro, City of Calgary parks superintendent, says he is sure that had the city not been under contract for hail suppression, many of Calgary's fine gardens would have been destroyed. Mr. McSorley says each year, as operational data grows, WRDC tries to improve its techniques. Further improvements and facilities would be used next year. The 1958 hail-suppression program lasted from June 1 to Sept. 25. The staff included a manager in Calgary, an assistant manager who acted as a field technician at Disbury, Alta., two experienced meteorologists, two aircraft pilots and two office secretaries. A total of 140 silver iodide generators were placed in and around the protected area. These generators operated on 75 of the 97 days of the contract period. The two aircraft either distributed silver iodide or did reconnaissance work on 72 of the 97 days. GAVE BETTER PROTECTION "Despite the fact that this year's coverage was smaller than last year," Mr. McSorley commented, "more generators were used this year giving better protection." He said this year forest tanager lookout tower personnel reported on weather conditions in the Rocky Mountain foothills. Another addition to WRDC operations this year was the establishment of a chemical plant for the manufacture of the explosive material used in seeding clouds for hail suppression. Company officials said that in general in 1958 in the protected area hail damage was spotty and light except for the Aug. 11 storm.

Pakistan Plans
OTTAWA (CP)—The dismissal of Pakistan's government and imposition of martial law in that country may force alterations in Prime Minister Diefenbaker's plans for a five-day visit to Pakistan next month.

An official in Mr. Diefenbaker's office said Wednesday: "We'll have to wait and see" how the prime minister's visit will be affected by the action taken by Pakistan's President Iskander Mirza.

President Mirza abolished the government and put the country under martial law pending the writing of a new constitution. Mr. Diefenbaker's world tour schedule has him staying in Pakistan from Nov. 13-18. Tentative

Convertibility
Of Sterling Is
Suggested Near
Mountbatten
Visits Victoria

MONTREAL (CP)—A British financier predicted Wednesday convertibility of sterling may come "much sooner than many think."

R. C. Quirk, senior member of the Council of the London Stock Exchange, told a press conference the pound sterling now is stronger than at any time in years.

But he suggested that the move to convertibility would possibly require the help of Canada to underwrite dollar needs for a few days after it was decided to make the pound freely exchangeable for other currencies.

He expressed the feeling that it should be possible to exchange sterling freely for other currencies, but added the maintenance of the present value of the pound should be the prime consideration of the government.

Mr. Quirk is a member of a party of European stock exchange officials making a 16-day tour of Canadian industries. The officials represent stock exchanges in Holland, Switzerland, Belgium, France, Germany and England.

NEW VESSEL FOR
Fisheries Dept.
OTTAWA (CP)—A new fisheries research vessel, the A. T. Cameron, will be turned over to the federal fisheries department at a ceremony Oct. 17 in Montreal.

The \$1,750,000 vessel, one of the most modern in the world, will be accepted from the builders, Marine Industries Limited, Sorel, Que., by Fisheries Minister MacLean who will turn it over to the fisheries research board.

The 177-foot craft, named after a former chairman of the board who died in 1947, will operate mainly in the Atlantic and Arctic fishing areas. It will be capable of trips lasting six to eight weeks.

The A. T. Cameron will be based at St. John's, Nfld., for about eight months and at Halifax about eight months of the year. It is equipped to perform oceanographic, hydrographic and survey work and contains five separate laboratories and an 1,800-cubic-foot fish hold.

Depth sounding and other electronic equipment has been installed in the ship. There are two radar sets and when one set is being used in survey operations the second can be used for navigation.

The hull is of steel and the superstructure of aluminum.

Bank Interest Rate Increases

OTTAWA (CP)—The Bank of Canada's interest rate rose to 2.64 per cent this week from 2.62 per cent last week, the central bank reported Thursday.

This figure compares with 2.62 per cent two weeks ago. The record low of 1.12 per cent was established in the week ended Aug. 2. The record high of 4.33 per cent was established Aug. 8, 1957.

The rate is set at one-quarter of one per cent above the average yield of short-term government treasury bills which was 2.39 per cent this week. This yield resulted from acceptance of bids on \$115,000,000 of the bills, maturing Jan. 9, 1959 at an average price of 99.407.

MOSCOW (AP)—A 21-year-old Soviet pianist, Vladimir Ashkenazi, is scheduled to leave for the United States in the next few days for a concert tour.
