The first Maritime Camp Council for Senior Canadian Girls in Training closed on August 24 after a successful and worthwhile ten days where seventy girls and thirteen leaders from more than forty-five Maritime centres enjoyed the fellowship of work, play and worship at the Chance Harbour M.R.-E.C. campsite, Pictou Co., N.S.

The camp closed with a simple but very impressive candle-lighting ceremony after the welcome of the new camp officers and the presentation of green maple leaves to each 1951 Camp Councillor. All campers who wear the green leaf are expected to promote the C.G.-I.T. program in their own church group and community.

New officers were elected for the coming year and for the 1952 Camp Council, Helene Manning, Bathurst, is the new President and Blanche Roper, New Glasgow, the Vice-President. Other executive members are: Elizabeth McCully, Port Hawkesbury; Beryl Woodside, Kensington and Dawn Vallis, Saint John.

The girls decided to try the experiment of a Maritime paper this C.G.I.T. year, beginning in January. One editor for each month was chosen as follows: Carol Woodworth, Kentville; Marilyn Bunnell, Saint John; Shirley Wilson, Sydney; Shirley Hamilton, Campbellton; Muriel Fraser, New Glasgow; Suzanne Squires, Fredericton. The purpose of the paper will be to increase the feeling of fellowship among Maritime Canadian Girls in Training groups.

The Camp Council crest was designed by Marjorie Laidlaw, Sydney Mines, N.S.

Important Features

The most important feature of the camp was the Council Ring which was held each day under the leadership of the Director, Miss Marjorie McBride. Girls' Work Secretary of the Maritime Religious Education Council, and the Camp officers, Mary Atkinson and Marjorie Laidlaw — Nova Scotia; June Bowman — Prince Edward Island; Judy Johnson and Kay Barclay — New Brunswick. Senior C.G.I.T. group materials were studied and suggestions for new improvements were made.

C.G.I.T. camping was another important topic and in this group the girls created a policy for Junior leaders at camp. The group that worked on finance, drew up a working budget for C.G.I.T. groups; made plans for National Camp night as well as plans for raising money to help carry on the girls' work of the Maritime Religious Education Council, which promotes the C.G.I.T. program.

The Conference group made plans for 1951-1952 C.G.I.T. Con-

ferences, the new conference theme — "To Know God Better" and the hymn, "We Would Be Building". The group on Group Planning outlined a year's program for the Senior group. This will be sent to all C.G.I.T. groups in the Maritimes in September as groups re-organize.

Organization and program of Girls' Councils was another important discussion topic. Recommendations are being sent to all organized councils and plans are made for the organization of new councils.

Will Choose Senior Groups

Many national C.G.I.T. issues were discussed such as a National C.G.I.T. Camp, 1952. Nine girls from the Maritime Provinces will attend. They will be chosen this year from Senior groups throughout the area. The Maritime Camp Councillors decided to recommend to all Senior groups in the Mari-

times that each study the course in leadership training this year. Christian Youth Week will be held February 3-9, 1952, with the theme, "Stand Fast in the Faith". In future years the girls have decided to recommend a separate Tuxis-C.G.-I.T. Week as in previous years.

The spirit of the camp was one of co-operation and enthusiasm from beginning to end. Everyone enjoyed the work and discussion groups as well as those of recreation and worship. During the evaluation session the last evening, it was recommended that the 1952 Council should be for a two week period and so plans are being made for another year with this in mind.

The two visitors of the Camp Council were Miss Maxine Morse, Halifax, Treasurer of the Girls' Work Board of the Maritime Religious Education Council, and Mr. Hugh Noble of the Department of Physical Fitness, Halifax.
