

Local and Other Items.

THE City School Board meets this evening at 8 o'clock.
The Steam Dredge is well employed at Rocky Point Wharf.
ROBERT YOUNG'S New Millinery will arrive in the M. A. Starr to-day.
A PLANKWAY is being laid on St. Peter's Road toward the Catholic Cemetery.
THERE are now twenty-five teachers employed by the School Board of this city.

A BUILDING on Grafton Street (cast) owned by Mr. Thomas Essery, is being fitted up for a school room by the School Board.

VICTORIA PARK is already becoming a great pleasure resort. It is beginning to present a very fine appearance. We suggest that better order be kept among the youthful visitors.

SUPERINTENDENT MANNING is now making his half-yearly examination of the City Schools. He is now engaged at St. Patrick's School. He has completed the examination of eleven classes.

THE remains of Frederick Hayward (not Haywood, as printed on Saturday) were taken in charge by the City authorities and interred in the Mount Edward Cemetery on Saturday evening. He was 58 years of age.

EXTRAORDINARY PASSAGE.—The barque Ralph B. Peake, Hobbs, arrived at Sydney, C. B., on the 19th inst. This vessel keeps up her good name, as she left Glasgow on the 7th inst., and has made the extraordinary quick passage of 12 days and 6 hours.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Wm. Duncan was fined \$5 or 20 days for being drunk and incapable; Isaac Hobbelenas, for assaulting Louis McDonald with a knife, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labor.

THE police have been examining the different yards and outbuildings in the City, during the past week. They are generally in a better sanitary condition than in former seasons, and we hear that there is very little cause for complaint.

THE people of Bangor have been visited by some of the Russian officers of the "Cimbric" now lying at Ellsworth, Me., and a great fuss was made over the Muscovites. They were driven around town by the Mayor, shown the fire engines, taken to the opera, dined and no doubt would have been wined, but for the Maine liquor law.

THE business of shipping is beginning to assume an active appearance. The majority of the spring arrivals have cleared with cargoes of grain and lumber, and only five square-rigged vessels remain to be loaded for foreign markets. There are a number of small crafts employed in coal and other trade at the wharves. These merely offer employment to the few that sail them.

THE running of a regular packet line between Boston and this Province will be immediately commenced by F. T. & W. L. Dean. Three fast-sailing and superior schooners have been engaged for the purpose. They offer great inducements to small shippers, as freight will be taken from all places on the Island that are accessible by water.

ISAAC HOBBLENAS, the Russian who was sentenced to jail on the 1st inst., for assaulting Louis McDonald, Mate of the Barkentine Erema, with a knife, was brought before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon for trial. The complaint of Mr. McDonald was heard. As the assault was considered provoked, the prisoner was sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labor. This sentence will date from the day of his first remand.

ANOTHER SUDDEN DEATH.—About 1.30 yesterday afternoon an elderly man named Robert Sentele, a clerk who lived in Cunard Street, was walking down Spring Garden Road. When nearly opposite the Drill Shed he was seen to throw up his arms and fall heavily on his face. Passers by immediately ran to his assistance. He was examined by a doctor who was passing and was found to be quite dead. The body was taken to the late residence of the deceased. —H. paper.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Russians Still at San Stefano.

The Pope to Spend the Summer at Naples.

RIOTING AMONG THE STRIKERS.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)
CONSTANTINOPLE, May 19.
The Russian headquarters are still at San Stefano, but the entire Russian army has moved northward, except a few companies. General Todleben has explained that the summons to the Turkish Commander to surrender Prindlikoi was the result of a misunderstanding.

NEW YORK, May 19.
The Herald's special says that in St. Petersburg circles Schouvaloff's journey, although he received marked Imperial favor, scarcely justifies the hopeful views of the situation that have been systematically reported to the public through inspired agencies. A move towards a compromise is proclaimed as a watchword of the day; but this is interpreted by the court party at St. Petersburg as a temporary attitude bearing especially on the question of the surrender of fortresses.

ROME, May 19.
It is believed that the Pope, yielding to the advice of his physician, will spend the summer at Monte Cassino, a Benedictine Abbey at Naples.

LONDON, May 18.
Rioting continues at Blackburn. The military and police are unable to preserve peace.
Mr. Gurney will ask the Government, next Tuesday in Parliament, what information it has relative to the fitting out of the Russian cruisers in America.

OTTAWA, May 17.
A Kingston despatch says:—A gentleman hailing from Pittsburg, Pa., reported that the Fenians on the other side were extremely active and meant business, and that a raid would be made on Canada, within ten days, or at any rate within a short period. A North Troy telegram says: Activity along the Canadian frontier in this vicinity goes to prove the correctness of the rumored Fenian invasion. A body of strangers are encamped in the woods near this place. They are all Irishmen, well dressed and intelligent. Accessions are being made to the camp hourly. There seems to exist a feeling along the border that an immediate invasion of Canada by a large army of Fenians is more than probable.

Rev. Mr. McNamara, of New York, lectured on "Irish Unity," to-night. There was large attendance. The object of the Rev. Father, who is a devout Catholic, is to reconcile two great branches of the Irish people—Orangemen and Catholics—and to do away with the conflicts which have been going on for years. He is opposed to Italian influence in the Catholic Church, and advocates an Irish Church, independent of foreign influence.

Trout fishing has commenced at Lake St. Charles, Quebec.
Mineral water has been discovered on the Island of Manicougan.
The complete re-conquest of Kashgar by China is announced.
Six hundred lives have been lost by an earthquake in Venezuela.
Affairs are very much unsettled in Hayti, owing to the existence of a monetary crisis.
Reports from Buffalo ridicule the idea of a Fenian raid upon Canada from that quarter.
The first haul of muskeler for the season was made by fishermen at Prospect, N. S., on Saturday.
Extensive forest fires have been raging for the past week at Vineyard Haven, Mass. Over 3,000 acres have been burned over.
The Montreal City Council have resolved to petition the Provincial Legislature to pass a law prohibiting all party processions.
The Quebec Graving Dock is to be deepened one foot, and contractors have been invited to amend their tenders accordingly.
Vera Sassulitch, who attempted to shoot the St. Petersburg Chief of Police, has been discovered in one of the suburbs of that city and arrested.
