"Go on with mine," said the man in the chair, "and charge me the same."—Washington Star.

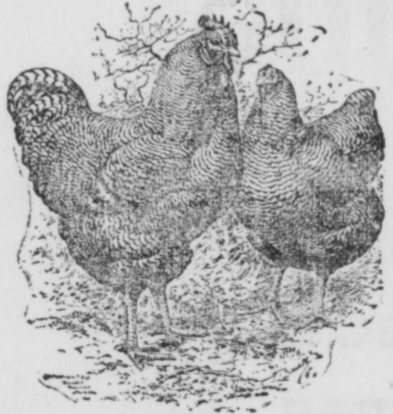
