The Dominion Exhibition. Continued Success of the Island Exhibits.

Prizes for Horses, Sheep, Cattle, Butter, etc.

EXHIBITION BUILDING, HALIFAX, N.S., Sept. 28.

About eight thousand spectators are on the grounds to-day. And still the interest seems to centre in the horse stables. Ladies as well as gentlemen, evince their love for the noblest of animals, by crowding around the stables. Among those most admired is

ALL RIGHT, whose great beauty, great speed, and good pedigree, many think, entitle him to a first place among the carriage stallions. He was on the track to-day, and there was some splendid trotting in which he led the way. Barrister's stall has been fairly besieged; while the horses of the Messrs. Rodd, and the Messrs. McKenzie, seem to be prime favorites. Visitors stare when told that some of the best horses on the Island were not sent to the Exhibition. The judges to-day have been very reticent. It is difficult to get even a hint of how the prizes are going; but is pretty well understood that Islanders have carried off first and second prizes in all the classes in which they compete. It is to be hoped that definite information about the horses will be obtainable to-morrow.

In its exhibits of sheep and cattle, the Island has been exceedingly fortunate.

Prizes for Cattle. Scarcely less successful are Island exhibitors of horned cattle. The four year old short-horn bull shown by George Compton, and the three year old short-horn bull shown by Fredk. Holland, are both objects of general attention. The stock-raisers of the neighboring Provinces have been struck with the fine points shown by each of them; and, it is said, have intimated their willingness to give fancy prizes for them. But Messrs. Compton and Holland have, very wisely we think, refused to listen to any overtures. It is, perhaps, too much the custom of Island farmers to sell off their best stock. If Messrs Compton and Holland had been men of that class, they would not occupy the proud position in the Dominion Exhibition which they do to-day. When their animals were judged not only were they each awarded the first prizes in their respective classes, but the judges complimented both of them very highly, and said that their animals would stand well in any exhibition in Canada. The Stock Farm exhibit of cattle is also undoubtedly the best in its respective classes. There are hosts of admirers and their will be lots of prizes. It is known that the Stock Farm has won the first prize for the best herd; and that several other first prizes have fallen to the Commissioners.

Prizes for Butter. While Miss Hayden, of Charlottetown, stands at the head of the class in the fancy work department, Mrs. Ferguson, wife of the Hon. Donald Ferguson, has won a not less honorable distinction as the maker of the best tub butter, having won prizes in both classes in which she competed. The array of butter was very fine, and it is most pleasing to find our ladies competing successfully against the rest of the Maritime Provinces. Mrs. Fairweather, of St. John, has, it is reported, won the first prize for fresh

butter. While her husband makes a speciality of raising Jersey cattle, Mrs. Fairweather seems to make a speciality of manufacturing good butter. While her husband shows a good example to professional men generally, Mrs. Fairweather shows a good example to ladies generally. Both deserve great credit for the honorable part they have taken in this Exhibition.

In this important department the Island was represented by but one exhibitor—Mr. Bridges; and his samples were not sent in until after the judges had awarded the prizes. They, however, inspected the samples the following day; and made honorable mention of them in their report.

It is greatly to be regretted that neither of the Island cloth manufacturers sent exhibits. Their fabrics would have compared very favorably with some shown to advantage by exhibitors in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
