IN MEMORIAM

MR. G. E. BROWN

A wide circle of friends would learn with deep regret of the death of Mr. George E. Brown, formerly of Margate, at his home near Charlottetown on Monday the nineteenth of February. Although he had reached his eighty-fifth milestone, yet he seemed not to grow old with the years; his outlook was still of wider horizons, his mind was clear, and until a few days previous to his passing he took a keen interest in his home, his community, and in world events.

Mr. Brown was a man of outstanding character and arresting personality. He was ever in the vanguard with those who strove for human uplift and welfare. In the Church he was a "tower of strength which stood four-square" and in his time, his energies, and his substance without reserve. For many years he was an active elder in the Presbyterian church, later the United Church at Kensington, and at Trinity in Charlottetown. His leadership proved invaluable. Under no circumstances did he compromise his principles although at all times tolerant and kindly in his judgments. He was a strong supporter of the Cause of Temperance and regardless of the odds did not falter in the struggle. Having "put his shoulder to the wheel" there was, with him, no thought of failure no thought of defeat. He was willing to "plow deep and straight with all his powers" and leave the outcome to a Higher Power. He was Chairman of the Prohibition Commission under the Saunders administration from 1927 until 1931 and was untiring in his efforts to advance the cause that was nearest his heart. Of him it could well be said, "One language held his heart and lip, straight onward to his goal he trod." He was a Liberal in politics, and on different occasions declined offers of nomination to represent his district in the legislature.

During the early years of the fox industry Mr. Brown although owner of a large and productive farm, took up fur farming, and was eminently successful in his venture. He raised some of the finest animals ever produced here or elsewhere. In his characteristic big heartedness he shared his success with others and some of the world's finest furs came from stock that he had raised. He leaves to mourn his passing a devoted wife, nee Gertrude M. Walker with whom he celebrated their golden wedding in November 1944, and five daughters, Mrs. Nettie Stewart, Charlottetown, Jennie, Mrs. Clarence Ketchum, New Hampshire, U. S. A., Ella,

His parents were William Brown, and his wife, formerly Elizabeth Clark, and the brothers and sisters Janie, Mrs. Andrew Johnstone, Long River, Sophia, Mrs. William Seaman, Springfield, Elizabeth, Mrs. Brewer Linkletter, Kensington, Andrew, of Broadview, Sask., Alexander, Long River. One sister Margaret, Mrs. Major Townsend, and one brother William predeceased him. He also leaves three half-sisters, Fanny, Mrs. Percy Miller, Lot 16, Emily, Mrs. Major Whitehead, and Mabel, Mrs. D. A. MacKenzie both of Kensington, also one half-brother Harry of Kensington.

The funeral service which was held at the home, Mount Edward Road, on Wednesday, February 21st was conducted by his pastor Rev. H. E. D. Ashford, B. A., B. D. who gave a most impressive address emphasizing the dauntless courage and buoyant faith which characterized Mr. Brown's attitude to life. Rev. J. M. Muechison, and Rev. W. J. MacLeod assisted. A service was also held for the friends at his old home in the United Church, at Kensington, and was conducted by the Rev. L. M. Murray, B. A., B. D., who spoke eloquently of Mr. Brown's qualities of heart and head comparing him to Barnabas that favorite and well-beloved character of the Bible. He was laid to rest under a bank of beautiful floral tributes in the family plot in Kensington cemetery.

The funeral was under the direction of his son-in-law Mr. J. L. Davison of Kensington.

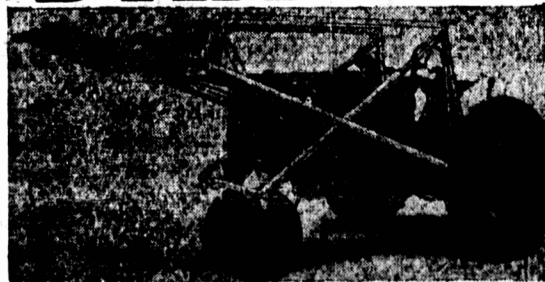

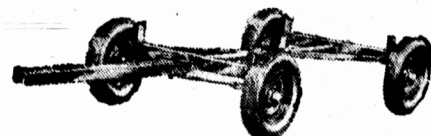
