

Local and Other Items.

EARLY SALMON.—The Telegraph reports that a few salmon have been caught at Dalhousie Cove within the past few days. This is early for the season.

SHIPPING SLEEPERS.—The first shipment of sleepers ever made by steamer from Buctouche was made recently by E. C. Cole, of Moncton, who has loaded the steamer Dorcas at that port.

EARLY POTATOES.—A New Brunswick exchange reports that Mr. Norman McNeill, Escuminac, Northumberland Co., dug potatoes on the 7th of April out of his field and found them in good order.

THE FARMERS PLEASED.—The Sussex correspondent of the St. John Sun says that the farmers of that place are in the highest spirits, owing to the very favorable weather for farm work, and larger quantities of all kinds of seeds will be put in the ground than has been planted or sown for many years.

AGRICULTURE.—Oarsmen O'Connor, Lee, Gaudaur, Hamm, and Peterson will row on the great Salt Lake on June 2, a single scull race, three miles with turn, for a \$1,500 purse, to be divided as follows: \$800 to the winner, \$400 to the second, \$200 to the third and \$100 to the fourth. A San Francisco man offers a \$150 purse to the man who breaks the world's record.

JEALOUSY THE CAUSE.—Maud McLellan, a young woman formerly employed as a domestic at the Clifton House, St. John, was recently shot and killed in Chicago by a man named Dempsey, whom she declined to marry. This is the second Provincial girl that has come to grief in Chicago at the hands of a jealous lover within a few months.

NOVA SCOTIA COAL MINES.—The St. John Globe says: There is a rumor afloat that some American capitalists have a scheme on foot to purchase all the coal mines in Nova Scotia. On the other hand it is alleged that it is proposed to buy only the Joggins mines and connecting railroads. The two Joggins coal companies are called to meet in St. John to consider the matter.

WHAT IS BEING DONE.—Montreal advice state that the attorneys for the defendants in the Jesuits' Mail case intend to present a motion for leave to appeal from the judgment of Judge Loranger, while, on the other hand, plaintiff's attorneys are preparing an answer in law asking that the allegations of the plea maintained by the same judgment be set aside on legal points.

PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY.—The first practice of the Society was much more successful than many persons anticipated. Seventy singers were present. We learn that the conductor has, in conjunction with Mr. Vinicombe, taken steps towards the immediate formation of an orchestra, as at first contemplated. The names of fifteen young ladies and gentlemen have been mentioned as instrumentalists of sufficient ability to justify their selection. Music for the orchestra has been ordered. Mr. Earle has kindly consented to be pianist for the Society.

A BOLD THEFT.—The Moncton Times says: About a week ago what might be called a remarkably bold robbery occurred at the McDonald farm in Upper Coverdale. During the night some twenty or thirty bushels of potatoes were taken from the cellar, the thieves getting in at the cellar windows, which had been left open, and unlocking the cellar door. During the night the occupants, who all slept in the upper story, thought they heard a noise down stairs, but on going down saw that all was right on the first floor, though the cellar was not examined.

CLARK BRADEN.—This distinguished divine, author of "Ingersoll Unmasked" and other works, is expected to deliver a course of lectures in Halifax next month. It is surmised that he has chosen that time on account of the visit of Charles Watts, the secularist orator, who speaks in that city about the same date. Mr. Braden has, on different occasions, crossed swords with Mr. Watts in discussion, and his friends think he has downed the secularist. It is probable that both speakers will meet in this city about the first of July.

AGAINST RITUALISM.—At a recent meeting of the congregation of St. Bartholomew church, Ottawa, a petition signed by 100 members of the congregation was presented to the rector, Rev. E. A. W. Hanington, complaining of ritualistic practices in the Church of England at large, and St. Bartholomew's church in particular. The specific charges are the wearing of colored book marks with crosses on them. The rector announced that this was not within the province of the vestry meeting. Nevertheless, he would carefully examine the statements made and reply to them.

A PLEASANT EVENING.—Captain Longworth, of No. 2 Batt., G. A., entertained the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the Battery at his residence last evening. Colonels Irving and Moore and Capt. Weeks were also present. After the usual loyal toasts had been duly honored, a number of impromptu toasts, mostly of a martial character, were proposed and responded to in pleasing speeches. It was the most successful and enjoyable company dinner that has yet been given in this city.

SETTLEMENT WITH LIQUOR DEALERS.—The Chairman of the Police Committee and the Chairman of the United Temperance Committee have held a meeting and considered the offer by the liquor dealers affected by recent decisions of the Supreme Court, with regard to a settlement. The parties concerned are not disposed to make any positive statement with regard to the matter, but it is understood that the terms of settlement are agreed upon, the liquor dealers to pay 35 per cent. of all costs and fines against them. It is further understood that the money is expected to be paid over this afternoon.—Moncton Transcript.

HALIFAX MARKET PRICES.—The Chronicle says: During the past week there has been a reduction of from ten to fifteen cents a barrel on some grades of flour. Eggs show an upward tendency. P. E. Island oats are selling for from one to two cents cheaper than a week ago, but there is a great scarcity of Nova Scotia and Canadian grain. Both Island potatoes and the home product are inclined to lower prices, in some cases five cents less per bushel being asked than formerly. American pork is somewhat cheaper, while P. E. Island mess of some grades has risen fifty cents a barrel; prime mess has been reduced half a dollar. Sugar is quoted at about a quarter of a cent higher than last week on nearly all qualities of the refined article, and molasses, of course, has made a corresponding advance, namely, about two or three cents per gallon.
