Roberts, One Of 6 Premiers To Be Honored Sat. At SDU

John Parmentier Roberts, premier of Ontario, will be one of six provincial premiers who will receive honorary degrees of Doctors of Laws at St. Dunstan's University Centennial Convocation scheduled for the SDU auditorium this Saturday beginning at 4 p.m. The ceremonies will be open to the public.

Mr. Roberts, a native of Banff, Alta., moved east as his father, a bank manager, was transferred, and received his early education in schools in Alberta, Manitoba and Ontario. He graduated from the University of Western Ontario in 1939, in time to join the Royal Canadian Navy as an ordinary seaman. He received his commission overseas and was mentioned in dispatches after the battle of Salerno.

Discharged in 1945 after seeing action in the Atlantic, Pacific, and Mediterranean theatres of war, Mr. Roberts returned to university, graduating from the University of Toronto in 1947. He first entered the Legislature in 1951, and was re-elected in 1955, 1960 and '61.

In December, 1960, he entered the Ontario cabinet as minister without portfolio and a year later was named minister of education.

In 1961 he was elected leader of the Ontario Progressive Conservative party and later the same year was sworn in as the 17th premier of Ontario.

Others who will receive honorary degrees Saturday from SDU are the premiers of Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

Following the parade, swimming events were held at the railway wharf and truck and field events were held at the park. G'town Centennial Day Feature Is Big Parade

GEORGETOWN — Centennial Day in Georgetown was celebrated yesterday and was kicked off in the morning with a mammoth parade which contained 15 floats and a number of bands and a contingent of navy personnel from HMCS Ingham in port for the celebration.

The parade was marshalled by A. B. McConnell and was headed by the RCMP and the Georgetown police. The mayor and town council, chairman Alex Arsenault of the Centennial committee, Lt. Cdr. C. R. Manifold, commanding officer of HMCS Ingham Arran, the Royal Canadian Legion Color party and the Georgetown fire department also participated in the parade.

Farm Credit Need Voiced

A Canadian Federation of Agriculture official Wednesday called on farm organizations to consider the establishment of some kind of agency to meet the growing need of farmers for short-term credit at reasonable interest rates.

"Farmers are good credit risks but they are often paying too much interest for operating credit," said Lorne Hurd of Ottawa, the federation's assistant executive secretary. He made the statement while bringing greetings from the federation to the annual congress here of the Co-operative Union of Canada.

Mr. Hurd cited a 1961 federal study showing that 40 per cent of farmers' operating credit is extended by farm supply and equipment companies at interest rates ranging upward from 16 per cent.

"Farmers shouldn't have to pay that much interest for operating credit," he said. "Farm organizations may have to build their own agency to meet their growing need for operating credit at reasonable rates and it may well be some kind of co-operative."

Old business was dealt with and then instruction was given on the various projects of the club. The program included games and a letter adjournment lunch was served.
