

Jerry's Nightmare Sets Maritime Mark

Bettors Old Mar. Bred 3-Year Old Pacing Record By More Than Three Secs.

Jerry's Nightmare, a sleek, smooth three year old mare owned by James O'Brien of Elmsdale and driven by Earl Semple, set a new record for Maritime bred three year old pacers last night as she paced a mile in 2:09 at the Charlottetown Driving Park.

The classy little mare, who promises to be the greatest ever to come out of the Maritimes, knocked off three and two-fifths seconds off the old mark held jointly by Dr. J. A. and Royal Bank. She also bettered the four year old record for Maritime pacers which is held by Billy McVey.

The O'Brien owned three year old gave the good crowd of racing fans in attendance a rare treat. She shot away from the rest of the field at the starting gate with amazing ease and opened up a good three length lead over the second place Mighty Deb by the time she reached the quarter pole.

She was leading by at least five lengths when she went past the half, pacing as though she had been born in the sulks. She maintained the lead for the last half with Mighty Deb finishing second.

Jerry's Nightmare was down to the first quarter in 31 4-5 seconds and at the half in 1:03 4-5. Time of the three-quarters was 1:35 2-5.

The mile by the three year old daughter of Abner T. Clegg and Leo's Nightmare was the fastest ever when she returned to the stable.

Owner James O'Brien was offered \$3,500 and a brood mare for her before the race. What her price tag is today is anybody's guess.

The fastest mile ever paced in the Maritimes by a three-year-old was turned in by Volrida at Fredericton several years ago. She paced the mile in 2:08.

Had Jerry's Nightmare been pushed last night she might have equalled if not bettered that mark. The Elmsdale bred mare looked as though she could do it.

She won the second dash of the three-year old pace in 2:12 2-5 with Mighty Deb finishing second. Henry showed his best form of the year and in the first dash must have come under the wire in a little better than 2:11.

In addition to Jerry's Nightmare's outstanding performance there were great miles turned in by other horses as the racing fans witnessed what was probably the best racing meeting of the season.

Abbeland and Babe Britton split the honors in the Free For All Pace with Abbeland winning the first dash and the Babe the second. Miss Knox and Prince Budlong each won a dash of the Classified Pace while Ranida and Sister Verna came up with winning performances in the first and fifth dashes.

Midi Goguen took Abbeland up from third position at the three-quarter pole to win the first dash of the Free For All. He passed Babe Britton in the stretch and won by half a length over the fast closing Johnny Kalmuck.

But the Babe wasn't to be denied in the second dash. Abbeland took over the lead at the quarter pole and held it to the stretch only to see Babe Britton win out in a photo finish after a stirring stretch duel.

Sister Verna, driven by E. Bernard, set a new mark of 2:15 4-5 in the second dash of the Classified Pace. She paced three-quarters of the mile in the stretch it was a duel between Sister Verna and Bob Canuck with the Dr. Hooper-owned mare winning by half a length.

Ranida won the opening dash after moving up from second position at the three-quarter mark past Bob Canuck and beating off a challenge by Sister Verna in the home stretch.

Miss Knox and Prince Budlong waged a stirring battle in the first

dash of the Classified Pace. Miss Knox went away in sixth position but driver Ed Downe had her in the lead by the time she reached the quarter pole, with Dale B. in second place.

Prince Budlong moved up from third at the three quarter mark past Dale B. and raced neck and neck with Miss Knox down the stretch. Miss Knox won in a photo finish with Prince placing second and Dale B. a good third.

Prince Budlong came up from second place to win the second dash. Miss Knox again took over the lead at the quarter pole but Prince won by nearly a length at the wire.

Jimmy McTague of Charlottetown picked the six winners on the score card and won the \$75.00 prize. The daily double on Miss Knox and Abbeland paid \$67.20.

White Sox To Use Virgil Trucks Against Yanks In Coming Crucial Games

Watch out, New York Yankees—the White Sox are going to throw fireballer Virgil Trucks at you this week-end.

The Chicago Sox, five games behind the Yanks in the American League race, picked Trucks against Philadelphia Athletics Tuesday night and the fireballer came through with a four-hitter as the Sox won 8-3.

Trucks was a surprise starter as manager Paul Richards threw him in early so he would be available for service in the crucial series at New York this week-end.

The 34-year-old righthander racked up his 14th win of the season in stifling the A's.

The Yankees meanwhile held their lead by massacring Detroit Tigers 16-0. The Tigers, who recently took four straight from the Red Sox in Boston, folded before the Yankees. Vic Rachi set a major-league record for pitchers by driving in seven of the Yankee runs as four Detroit pitchers gave up 15 hits.

The Red Sox snapped their eight-game losing streak as pinch-hitter Floyd Baker doubled with the bases loaded and two out in the eighth to provide a 6-2 victory

Two Teams Drop Out Of American Hockey League

ST. LOUIS (AP)—St. Louis and Indianapolis Tuesday suspended operation of their American Hockey League franchises for this season.

Emory Jones, president of the St. Louis Flyers, also resigned as president of the league, a position which he held last year.

A club spokesman here said Jones, in replying to the announcement from Atlantic City, N. J., gave him no indication as to the possible future of the league which is now left with six teams.

Dick Miller, president of the Indianapolis Coliseum Corp., said a working agreement with a National Hockey League Club but he called because he could not give assurance that any agreement would last more than a year. He said such an assurance was impossible because of the lease situation at the Indiana Fairgrounds Coliseum.

Jones said the inability of Detroit Red Wings to supply the St. Louis club with players, the heavy expenses involved by travel and the failure of Indianapolis to resume action in the league brought about suspension of the franchise here. The St. Louis franchise was suspended for the 1953-54 season.

It was the second straight year that professional hockey had been absent from the Indianapolis scene.

St. Louis entered the league in the 1944-45 season but hockey had been an annual winter feature here since 1928. The Flyers had previously been in the old American Hockey Association.

Clubs which now remain in the league include Cleveland, Providence, R. I., Buffalo, N. Y., Pittsburgh, Syracuse, N. Y., and Hershey, Pa.

Walls-Cockell Fight Possible

EDMONTON, (CP)—Canadian heavyweight champion Earl Walls may return here to fight Don Cockell for the British Empire heavyweight title, Edmonton fight promoter Jack Berry said Monday night.

Negotiations were opened for the fight when the Rex Layne-Walls rematch in Salt Lake City was postponed indefinitely.

Berry said Walls might meet the winner of Friday's Joe Kahut-Frank Buford match here if an Empire title bout can not be arranged.
