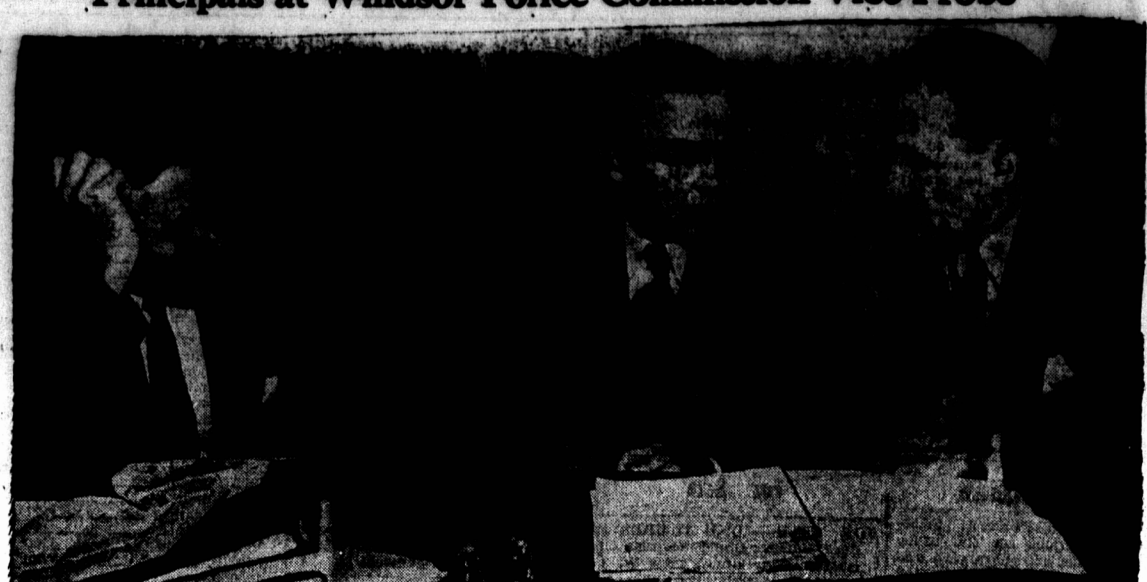
\$5,000 HOLDUP
