Mineral Production In Canada At New High

OTTAWA, Jan. 1 - (CP) - Canada's mineral production went past the \$1,000,000,000 mark for the first time in 1950.
The \$1,040,000,000 value for 1950 given in a preliminary estimate by the Bureau of Statistics compared with \$901,000,000 for 1949. It also contrasted strikingly, the Bureau reported, with a \$65,000,000 value 50 years ago.
The actual 1950 value probably was considerably higher than the official figures, for a significant omission from the total was the output of pitchblende products from the Northwest Territories. Production and value of these products - from which atomic fission materials are extracted - are secret.
Gold, worth \$168,500,000, again was the leading mineral product in value. The quantity recovered was up 7.3 per cent from 1949.
Value of all metals was \$620,900,000, compared with \$538,900,000 the previous year. Price advances late in the year, after an early slump, brought higher average returns than in 1949.
Copper production slipped slightly in tonnage but was up 17 per cent in value. Nickel declined 4.3 per cent in quantity but gained 14.5 per cent in value. Lead was up six per cent in tonnage but off slightly in value.
Substantial increases in Alberta's crude petroleum output were largely responsible for a 10-per-cent increase in value of mineral fuels to \$201,700,000. Crude petroleum went up to 29,000,000 barrels, compared with 21,000,000 the year before.
Coal dropped slightly in tonnage to an even 19,000,000, and its value also dropped from \$110,915,000 to \$110,042,000.
The mineral output value by provinces, with 1949 figures in brackets: Newfoundland, \$25,900,000 (\$27,500,000); Nova Scotia, \$90,100,000 (\$86,000,000); New Brunswick, \$12,600,000 (\$7,100,000); Quebec, \$217,600,000 (\$165,000,000); Ontario, \$362,900,000 (\$323,300,000); Manitoba, \$32,800,000 (\$23,800,000); Saskatchewan, \$36,100,000 (\$36,000,000); Alberta, \$134,500,000 (\$113,700,000); British Columbia, \$142,100,000 (\$136,300,000); Northwest Territories (excluding radioactive products), \$8,100,000 (\$6,800,000); Yukon, \$7,800,000 (\$5,000,000).

Search for Peace Goes on in Korea After Six Months

Christmas Day—the day of the Prince of Peace—marked the six months anniversary of the start of the Korean war. The action-packed six months have seen what started as a "police action" which the Western World hoped to confine to Korea, flame into a fearful crisis that threatens to engulf the world in a third all-out war. Here are illustrated monthly highlights from the invasion of South Korea by North Korean armies to the intrusion into the picture of the gigantic Chinese Communist military machine.



RED DAGGER was plunged into unprepared South Korea June 25. Bewildered Americans were jarred out of peaceful Sunday pastimes, wondered what it meant. Two days later President Truman ordered U. S. military forces to South Korea's aid.



OUTNUMBERED and outgunned GI's were forced into bitter retreat down the peninsula as well-planned Communist offensive gained momentum. Enemy armor played havoc with United Nations troops—until Yanks got some tanks of their own.



PUSAN HARBOR was chief supply port for Allies bottled up in the famous "Pusan Perimeter." Back to the wall, UN soldiers fought desperately for time a fresh troops and vital supplies poured into Korea's only deep draft harbor.



MASTER STROKE was the successful landing at Inchon, port of Seoul, designed by UN Commander Gen. Douglas MacArthur. It cracked the backbone of the North Korean Army which scattered northward in confusion with Allies in hot pursuit.



HAPPY WARRIORS played Old Glory on the ice-covered Yalu River boundary of Manchuria. Military potential of the North Korean Army was reduced to nothing as UN army smashed toward the frontier. Looked like it was all over but the shouting.



BIG BROTHER showed his hand as hundreds of thousands of fanatical Chinese Reds poured across the border. Vanguard of the million-man army stopped the Allies cold, cutting off their advance units. Another heart-breaking retreat was underway.



WITH UN forces fighting desperately to hold precarious lines, UN delegates struggled to obtain a cease-fire truce. Red China's representative, Gen. Wu Hsiu-chuan devoted his speeches to sneers as Peking laid down harsh peace terms.
