Some years ago he sold his farm and carried on successfully his restaurant business at Murray Harbour. Through his quiet, unassuming manner he won many friends. He was a friend to all, and especially the little children. His humor proved of great value in his many relationships with the general public.

His funeral was conducted from Murray Harbour United Church on Sunday, Nov. 4th.
