SIR OLIVER LEAVES POLITICAL LIFE.

He is Glad to Get Rid of it.

A Point Gained by the States.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—Sir Oliver Mowat said good-bye to political life yesterday. He attended his last cabinet council, and shortly after four toddled down stairs to his office, when the clerks of the Justice Department filled in and bade the minister good-bye. A few minutes later Sir Oliver left the buildings, his face beaming with pleasure, as if he were glad to quit politics.

An order-in-council has been passed permitting United States fishing vessels to land fish at Pacific Coast points and ship in bond to the States.

WASHINGTON NEGOTIATIONS'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—The Behring meeting closed yesterday afternoon, the seal experts making an unanimous report concerning the condition of the seal herds and the diplomatic representatives of the two governments reaching an understanding by which they hope, at a later day, to effect final adjustment not only of the Behring Sea Question but of other pending border controversies.

A Stir in Political Circles.

Laurier Again in Torres Vedras.

MONTREAL, Nov. 17.—The news of the Pope's decision in the school case from Rome, has caused considerable stir in political circles.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at Washington, refused to talk on the subject.

Archbishop Langevin would express no opinion.

Attorney General Cameron, of Manitoba says that the decision is to be regretted.

SERIOUS AFFAIR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Town Razed by a Furious Chief.

Thousands of Natives Massacred.

PARIS, Nov. 17.—There is serious news from the Niger Region in West Africa. Chief Samony, to punish the people of the town of Kongo for refusing to supply his troops with provisions, has razed the town and massacred several thousand of the natives.

Militia Inspection.

HALIFAX, Nov. 17.—General Gascoigne inspected the 66th Fusiliers last night. He charged that the battalion had too many army reserve men in the ranks and that this must be stopped.

Another Liberal Elected.

MONTREAL, Nov. 17.—The by-election in Yamaska County, for the Local Legislature, resulted in the return of Mr. Glad, Grit, by about 300 majority over Mr. Mondon the Conservative candidate.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

RICHMOND, Nov. 15.—A family of nine persons, who have been scouring at Kingston since the summer, were sent to their home in Montague, P. E. Island, on Thursday by the overseer of the poor and other assistance.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—A despatch to the Times from Rio Janeiro says that President Moraes has issued a decree establishing martial law for a period of twenty days. The evidence of a political conspiracy in connection with the recent attempt to assassinate the president is increasing. The city, however, is quiet, and public opinion supports the course of the executive. The prefect of police, who is a prominent Jacobin, has resigned. The police prohibit the gathering of people in the streets. All things considered the situation, is improving.

WINNIPEG, Man., November 14.—The Presbyterian Synod of Manitoba, before adjourning appointed a committee to meet committees that other denominations have appointed, or may appoint, with a view of seeing whether something more might not be done to secure larger attention being given to religious teaching in the public schools. Rev. Dr. King observed that this was an extremely important subject. It had seemed premature to agitate the matter until the school question, so-called, was finally settled, but he would feel deeply disappointed if the permanent settlement were taken advantage of for the purpose of having the religious element in the schools a larger one than it is now. If anything were done effectively, it could only be done by the churches taking the subject to heart and working together.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Standard, who is visiting the Ismid district, telegraphs that he has learned there of terrible ravages of sickness in the Turkish Army in Thessaly. Of 200 reserves who were taken from the district only forty have returned to their homes. Turkish transports are daily embarking the sick, the number of whom, it is estimated, is 30,000. Reports from Thessaly describe the province as a perfect waste. The Ottoman troops have actually eaten up the whole country. Houses have been gutted by the troops and their contents sold to Jewish syndicates.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The Berlin correspondent of the Standard says:—"The German cruiser Division, at Kisochan Bay consists of the flagship Kaiser, which has 444 men, the second-class cruisers Irene and Princess William, each with 365 men and the third-class cruiser Arcona, with 286 men. The division is under command of Rear Admiral Von Diederichs. It is doubtful that the occupation of Kisochan, if effected, will last long, as Russia has been negotiating for the cession of Kisochan Bay and Tsia Bay, in order to use them as naval ports."
