WHITEHALL, Aug. 11.—The Queen has been pleased to direct Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal, granting the dignity of a Baronet of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, unto George Etienne Cartier, of the city of Montreal, in the Province of Quebec, in the Dominion of Canada, Esq., Minister of Militia in the Privy Council of the Dominion of Canada, and to the heirs-male of his body, lawfully begotten.
