"WHIRLPOOL" NEW MYSTERY DRAMA

"Whirlpool" is a topnotch thriller, one of the most exciting entertainments to have hit town since Twentieth Century-Fox gave us "Laura." Now it has sent us another gripping, sleek and suspenseful yarn in "Whirlpool," the picture that is winning unstintingly enthusiastic acclaim at the Capital Theatre. The Ben Hecht-Andrew Solt screenplay, based on a Guy Endore novel, tells of a pretty, well-to-do psychiatrist's wife who suffers from kleptomania and becomes involved with a hypnotist who promises to cure her before her husband ever finds out. Instead she becomes involved in a murder and blackmail plot engineered by the medical charlatan, from which it takes all the professional skill of her psychiatrist husband and a sympathetic police officer to extricate her. Gene Tierney, prettier than ever, gives her most compelling dramatic performance as the innocent victim of the spider-like hypnotist's intricately woven web. Richard Conte is a forceful hero as the husband and the ever reliable Charles Bickford gives one of his most powerful performances as the policeman. But it is the young man who only last year was hailed by The New York Times as "the foremost actor of his generation," Jose Ferrer, who is the sensation of "Whirlpool" in the provocative role of the hypnotist.
