TIMELY NOTES ON FUR FARMING

Attorney General Jacob K. Javits of New York has issued an injunction against sales tactics which suggest that raising chinchillas can lead to easy riches.

A total of 1,266 Empress chinchilla pelts has been purchased by Frishman and Gintel, manufacturer, through Mechutan Fur Corp. in private treaty. The quantity was the largest of its kind to a single buyer since Farmers Chinchilla Cooperative of America began marketing two years ago.
