Attendance, while not as large as on Thursday, was most satisfactory at these events which included the crowning of Sea Queen Sandra Rogers, of Coleman.

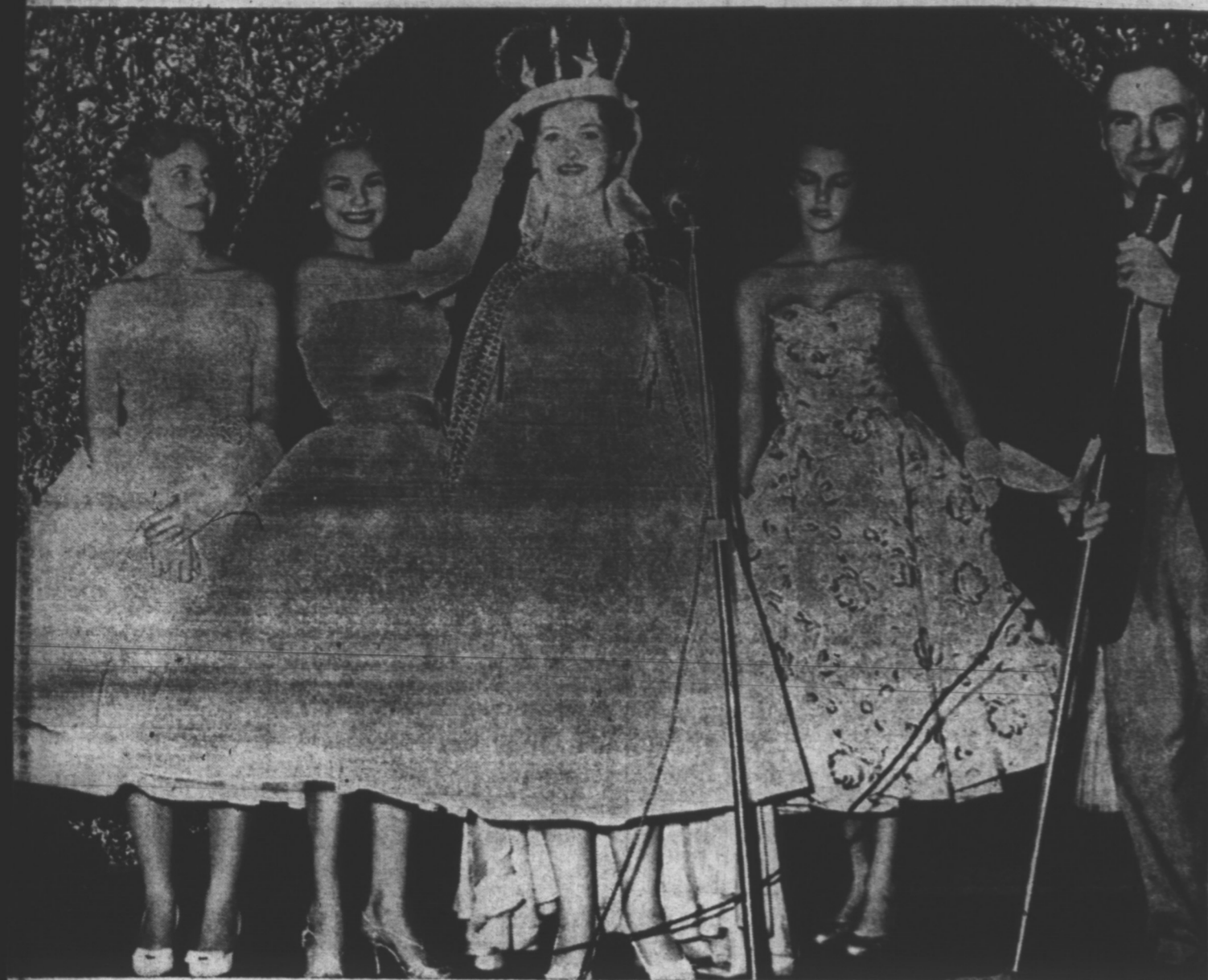

Lobster Carnival Program Attractive For Final Day

A heavy program is lined up for the final day of the Summerside Lobster Carnival headed up by the track and field meet to be held at Queen Elizabeth Park starting this afternoon at 1:15. It is understood that one of Canada's top runners, Joey Mullins of Cape Breton will compete and undoubtedly records will be smashed.

Mullins is in top condition having trained extensively for the Pan-American Games and the University of Nebraska student has the fastest half-mile in the U.S. to his credit when he was clocked at 1:49.

Another outstanding Maritime athlete, and a local product at that, Summerside's Alf Groom will be competing in the pole vault event, only two days after breaking the Maritime record at the Antigonish Highland games on Wednesday, when he vaulted 13 feet 8 inches. The Canadian record is 13 feet 9 inches. And he did it with a borrowed pole.

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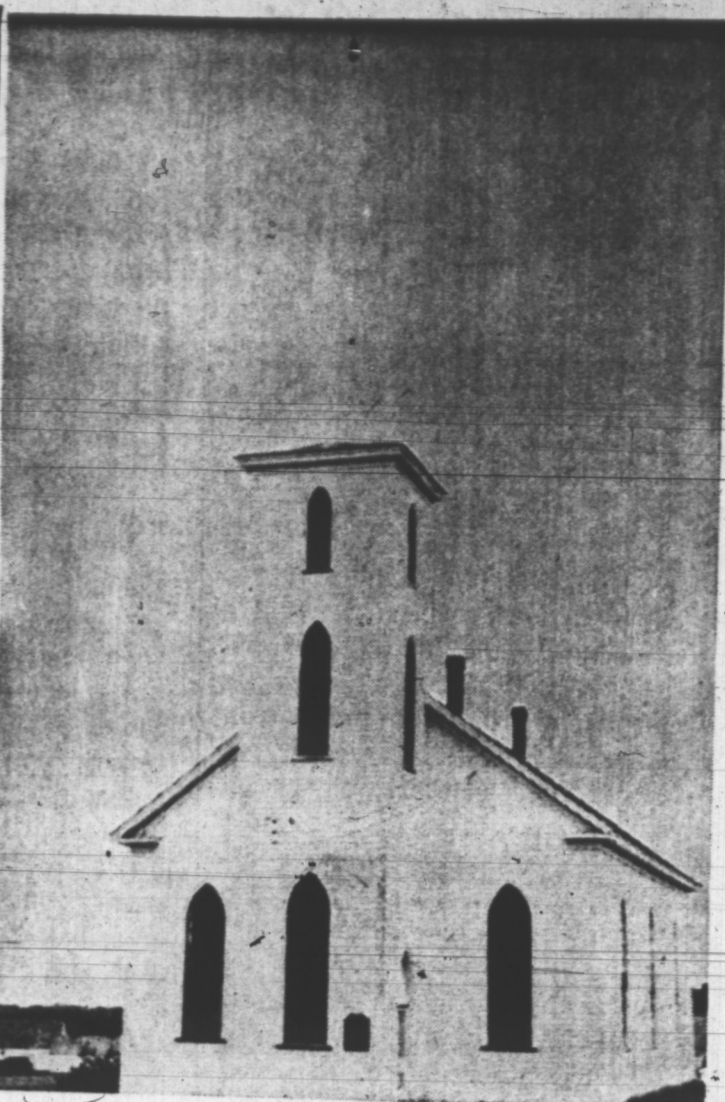
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THE CONGREGATION of Orwell Head United Church will observe its 128th anniversary tomorrow. The church, shown above, was built in 1864 through the efforts of Rev. Donald MacDonald who came to Prince Edward Island from Perthshire, Scotland in 1826.

Orwell Head United Church To Mark 128th Anniversary

ORWELL HEAD—Orwell Head United Church will celebrate its 128th anniversary tomorrow. The special speaker at both services to be held at 11 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. will be Rev. Douglas I. MacEachern, B.A., B.D., of Hopewell, N.S.

Orwell Head congregation was founded and built up by the Rev. Donald MacDonald who came to Cape Breton from Perthshire, Scotland in 1824 and made his way to Prince Edward Island in 1826 to visit a brother who had taken up land in the vicinity of Orwell.

Here he found his life work and entered upon it in the spirit of a true evangelist. Multitudes flocked to hear him in barns, dwellings, school houses and in the open air.

Rev. Mr. MacDonald whose parish extended from Bedeque to Murray Harbor carried on his ministry in Orwell Head for nearly 40 years. During his life time he built 14 churches of which the present Orwell Head Church built in 1864 is one of them. At the time of the building of this church, Mr. MacDonald was 81 years of age.

Mr. MacDonald died in 1868 in his 85th year and the 51st year of his ministry, and is buried in Orwell Head Cemetery beside the present church. An imposing monument marks his resting place.

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BATTLE CONTINUES

Illegal fishing of lobsters continues to be a problem for the Department of Fisheries in the Maritimes. It's fleet of more than 30 boats are continually prowling the rich lobstering grounds off the three provinces to curb those fishermen who believe that the lobstering grounds are inexhaustible. Typical of the department's sea operations is the above picture which shows P.J. MacDougall, Mount Stewart, skipper of patrol boat Royal Oak, holding a lobster he has removed from an illegally-set lobster trap. The Royal Oak stationed last year by outlaw lobstermen at Tignish run - operates out of Savage Harbor. This picture was made a few miles off Covehead Bay. About 15 freshly-baited traps were confiscated on the afternoon the picture was taken. Lobstering on that section of the coast ended officially on June 30. (Department of Fisheries Photo)
