NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, July 22. It is reported that the Wabash, St. Louis and Pacific Road, which connects with the Union Pacific there will, on Sunday, put on trains from here to New York, reaching New York from twelve to fifteen hours ahead of the other lines.

NEW YORK, July 22. The 750 Scandinavians, who arrived last night, left for Utah this morning, being Mormon converts.

BOSTON, July 22. The census supervisor makes Boston's population 363,565—an increase of 71,066 in ten years.

BURLINGTON, Vt., July 22. The Democratic State Convention have unanimously nominated Edward J. Phelps of this city, for Governor.

The mission of Gen. Thomaston to Greece is to reorganize the Greek army.

Official intelligence from Bosuteland announces a general refusal on the part of the natives to disarm. European women and children are being sent away. A general native rising is seriously apprehended.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 22. Greece has just decided to mobilize her army.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 22. Gen Weaver, the Greenback nominee for President addressed a large audience in the theatre to-night, making a strong attack on the national banks and uttering the usual denunciation of the two political parties.

NEW ORLEANS, July 22. A shed at New Lake End blew down to-day, smashing eleven boats belonging to six amateur clubs, intended for use in the coming State regatta.

WASHINGTON, July 22. Orders were sent this morning to Admiral Wyman at Port Royal, to proceed at once with the Tennessee to Havana.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 22. Yesterday afternoon John Houston, colored, attempted rape upon a six year old daughter of Jason Cannon, jr., near Shelbyville, Tenn., and was arrested by the child's father and several neighbors. While in custody a party of masked men hanged him.

NEW YORK, July 22. Dr. Tanner's fast remains unbroken. Despite rain and muggy weather he averred that the air was fresher than it had been from start. He did not take his usual evening ride, but remains in the hall conversing with attendants and taking short naps.

LONDON, July 22. A large party of Jesuits, expelled from France, have entered upon the occupancy of a house at Aberdare, South Wales.

PARIS, July 22. Henri Rochefort has declined to be a candidate for member of the Municipal Council from Belleville, in the place of Trinquet, Communist on the ground that the people had a perfect right to elect Trinquet.

LONDON, July 22. A Berlin despatch says that the real aim of the German Government in sending German officials to Constantinople is to hinder the present situation in the East being used by some of the Powers to form a coalition against Germany. German diplomatists are there willing to take a very active part in the regulation of Eastern affairs, in order not to be surprised by any unforeseen intrigues.

VIENNA, July 22. The latest from Constantinople is that the Albanians to evacuate the positions they have at Tusi.

LONDON, July 22. It is stated that a peerage will shortly be accepted by Sir Hartcourt Johnstone, Liberal member of Parliament, and that the Liberal candidate for the seat thus rendered vacant at Scarborough, will be John George Dedson, recently unseated for Chester.

The Irish members of the Commons will only move one amendment to the Compensation Bill on the report which will be to the effect that the principles of the bill are not sufficiently broad.

MANILLA, July 22. Earthquake tremblings continue. Telegraph office is wrecked and several houses fell last night.

COWHIDED BY A WOMAN.—Wilmington, Del., July 20.—George Lewis, well connected in this city, was yesterday cowhided by Mrs. John McCoy, because, as she alleges, he slandered her. Mrs. McCoy drove out with her husband to the place where Lewis was employed; the husband held a pistol to Lewis' head while the woman inflicted the chastisement.

A WASHINGTON despatch says that the Report of the Commissioner of Agriculture, just issued, shows that in addition to the bounteous crops which the farmers will gather this year, they have also been made richer by an increase of about eight per cent., taking the average of the whole country in the price of farm lands as compared with prices one year earlier. The timber lands evince a tendency to appreciate in value more rapidly than cleared lands, showing a decrease in area of timber.

A STRANGE CASE.—The Carleton Sentinel of last week contains a couple of notices which seem to tell a strange story. One is a notice of marriage, the other a notice of desertion. The names in both cases are the same. The marriage was solemnized on the 30th ult. The notice of desertion of "bed and board" bears date the 14th inst. The desertion notice says there was the wife of a fortnight or less left without "just cause or provocation." A strange case, surely.—Religious Intelligencer.
