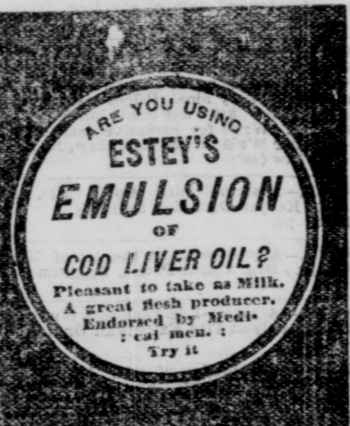

### Politics in Germany.

WILLIAM II. has fallen upon evil times  
—for autocrats. His recent Brandenburg  
speech has been criticised almost as freely  
as if he was not the Kaiser. If the tele-  
graphic news be true the leaders of the  
National-Liberal and Freisinnige Parties in  
Reichstag, have been exchanging con-  
fidences with a view to concerted action  
against the Emperor's absolutism. These  
parties have widely divergent programmes.  
But they intend to unite and show the Em-  
peror that he cannot carry matters with too  
high a hand. It is said that the question  
discussed in the lobbies of the Reichstag  
has been what plan of campaign ought to  
be adopted against the Government. The  
leaders of the Freisinnige party want to  
challenge openly the pretensions of the  
Emperor by raising a debate in regard to  
the pending press prosecutions. The more  
cautious National-Liberal tacticians, how-  
ever, advocate the adoption of a policy of  
obstruction in the Reichstag and Landtag  
in the consideration of the estimates, using  
whatever constitutional checks the deputies  
have on the Government in granting or  
withholding money. This latter policy  
has already been adopted in respect to an  
appropriation for the construction of  
cruisers and corvettes. The Reichstag has  
refused to pass it.

While domestic affairs are thus compli-  
cated, the relations of the Emperor with  
the outside world are not apparently very  
cordial with either England or Russia. The  
Czar is reported to have responded to his  
threat to "pulverize" Russia by the re-  
mark that he would have "pleasure" in  
throwing a half million of men across the  
German frontier. These compliments may,  
perhaps, result in action. A brush between  
the two nations would probably have the  
effect of ridding both autocrats of some of  
the troublesome domestic questions by  
which both are worried.

### Notes and Comments.

Five years of power added \$13,000,000 to  
the provincial debt, increased the annual out-  
lay by over a million dollars, produced an  
annual deficit of six hundred thousand dollars,  
and took from the treasury to put into the  
pockets of himself, his colleagues, his follow-  
ers in the Legislature, his relatives and  
political associates, as has so far been estab-  
lished on uncontradicted testimony, a sum of  
over three hundred and thirty thousand  
dollars. Yet Mr. Mercer seems to think  
that he is an unselfish man, that the people  
have relegated him to obscurity.

It is not probable that there is any truth  
whatever in the report, which comes from  
Washington, that the United States cruiser  
will once more seize Canadian schooners in  
Behring Sea unless the modus vivendi is  
accepted by the British Government. The  
American Government at the demand of Lord  
Salisbury ceased from seizing Canadian ves-  
sels in Behring Sea during a whole season  
prior to the signing of the modus vivendi, and  
it is extremely unlikely that it will renew a  
course which under the circumstances is  
manifestly fraught with great danger. If  
the American government interferes with  
Canadian vessels it will run the risk of ending  
the arbitration treaty and the way from  
Nova Scotia. The number of white men  
actually engaged is over 800, and 541 Indians  
are likewise employed. Premier Robt. in  
said the time had now come when the British  
Columbia government must speak with au-  
thority and demand her full rights.

Under the heading "Another American  
Butcher," the London Times a few  
days ago printed a letter signed "Capt.  
Frank Scott," 37 h Pennsylvania Rifles, a  
protesting a sin what the writer calls the  
Times' interference in American politics,  
because Mr. Egan is an Irishman. The  
writer of the letter says that in the event  
of war between England and the United  
States Canada will be captured before  
England has time to act, that a heavy fleet  
of steel cruisers will blockade the English  
coast within five days, that Liverpool will  
be destroyed, that England will be overrun  
by an American Army of two million men  
in a couple of months, and much more to  
the effect that Great Britain will be blotted  
out from the map of the world.

The Winnipeg Free Press remarks that  
the claim that the Catholic vote in Ontario is  
growing solidly for the Ottawa Government is  
not borne out by the returns from E. S.  
Immer. The township of Madoc, which has  
a considerable Catholic vote, increased its  
Conservative majority from 131 last year to 44  
this; but this may be owing to other causes.  
Orillia township has also a considerable Cath-  
olic vote, and the majority there is 7, 9 in  
favor of the Conservatives. The township of  
Catholic vote, and it increased its Liberal  
majority from 169 to 178. The township of  
Orillia, which is three-fourths Catholic, vot-  
ed exactly the same Liberal majority this year  
that it gave last, 135. The principal changes  
were in the Pottery and largely Orange  
township of Tav, where the Conservative ma-  
jority was increased from 175 to 232, and in  
the Highland Scotch Presbyterian G. it vot-  
ed 1 from 161 to 108, the smallest in twenty  
five years.

## Celebration at the Unive sity of Ottawa.

Yesterday being the feast of St. Thomas  
Aquinas, the great Cath. theologian and  
philosopher, was celebrated, as usual, in a  
most befitting manner by the faculty and  
students of the Ottawa University. On  
Sunday evening the students of the faculty  
of theology gave an entertainment, consist-  
ing of dissertations on subjects of Christian  
doctrine. Yesterday morning His Grace  
the Archbishop of Ottawa celebrated pon-  
tiffical high mass in the university chapel,  
and immediately following there was a pub-  
lic philosophical discussion in the academic  
hall. D. Murphy, B. Ph., president of the  
St. Thomas Academy delivered the  
opening address. Mr. P. Cullen, '92,  
then read a thesis "On the Nature of  
Logical Truth," which, together with the  
Thomist doctrine with regard to  
skepticism, he deeded against the objec-  
tions advanced by Friars Maurice and Sab-  
astian. Following this was a dissertation  
on "The Right of Private Property," by  
T. McNally, B. Ph., who had to answer  
the objections brought forward by D.  
Murphy, B. Ph., and A. Charron, B. Ph.  
The discussion showed on the part of the  
disputants much familiarity with the Latin  
tongue, and with the syllogistic form of  
argument, and a full knowledge of the sub-  
ject treated. His Grace congratulated the  
students on their philosophical ability, and  
the faculty on their success as teachers.  
When in the Eternal City, His Holiness  
Leo XIII., in speaking of the University,  
exhorted him to educate the young men  
under his charge to be staunch defenders of  
truth. After listening to to-day's discus-  
sion, he felt satisfied, he said, that the  
labours of the faculty of his alma mater  
would bring about the realization of the  
fondest wishes of our Holy Father.—  
Ottawa Citizen, 8th March.

(Our readers will doubtless recognize in  
the names of Cullen and McNally, B. Ph.  
the two Island boys who are carrying  
everything before them at the Ottawa  
University. We anticipate that our Ot-  
tawa correspondent will have something to  
say about them in next week's letter.  
Meanwhile, we content ourselves with con-  
gratulating not only their relatives, but  
Islanders generally, upon the way in which  
these young men are distinguishing them-  
selves.—Ed

### Crapaud Notes.

La grippe is prevalent in this part of the  
country, and in consequence our medical  
men are kept busy.  
The Division which was organized about  
a month ago is progressing.  
Business men are complaining of dull  
times at present, but I think this can be  
attributed to the almost impassable state of  
the roads. The pitches have been awful,  
but we must give praise where due. The  
overser between Victoria and Crapaud  
Corner has done faithful work in leveling  
pitches and opening water drains, in which  
much cannot be said about overseers in  
other sections.

The petition asking the Local Govern-  
ment for a small grant for our Local Exhi-  
bition is being numerously signed, and I  
have no doubt when presented it will re-  
ceive due consideration.  
The Crapaud Literary Society is likely to  
become a flourishing institution, as some of  
our most prominent men are taking an  
active part.

### North Lake Notes

During the very fine weather of late a  
great many of the farmers in this vicinity  
have put a large quantity of mud, which  
they are beginning to find is a very good  
fertilizer. They are mostly all done haul-  
ing their mud when poles, and are looking  
forward to an early spring.  
The ice off the coast appears to be much  
lighter than usual, and the fishermen an-  
ticipate an early season. Messrs M. W. W.  
McLean & Co are making preparations to  
open an extensive addition to their lobster  
factory at No. 1, as the accommodations for  
the large catches taken last year were in-  
sufficient.

The anglers are making severe havoc  
of the trout and smelt here. A very hand-  
some trout was captured lately by  
Hon. Thomas Kiekham, of Souris, who, it  
seems, can outwail any of our local anglers,  
even the famous Mr. Fahie.  
Our enterprising merchant, Mr. Thom-  
son, is doing quite a lively business here  
this winter. He has a large quantity of  
goods stored up for the spring shipment and  
expects to reap a good profit.  
Some very distinguished visitors have  
made their arrival at this place and are  
registered at the "Hotel de McNally." One,  
a celebrated artist, intends making  
some sketches of the surrounding locality  
at the earliest date possible.

AFTER DAMAGES.—Halifax advices of the  
9th are as follows: The notice required by  
a writ in bringing action against the city  
was served in two more cases to-day. Ad-  
miralty gives notice that he will bring an  
action for \$10,000 for damages to and loss of  
dock by the upper Water street fire last fall.  
P. Roman notifies the city that he will  
bring an action for \$2,000 for loss and dam-  
age to stock through the same fire.
