

## Green Bay Packers & Colts Place Four On All-Stars

NEW YORK (AP) — Green Bay Packers and Baltimore Colts each placed four men on the all-National Football League team selected for the Associated Press by a 42-man committee of sports writers and sportscasters, three from each of the 14 league cities.

Halfback Gale Sayers and Linebacker Dick Butkus, the Chicago Bears' rookie stars, also made the team.

Jim Brown, of Cleveland Browns was the only unanimous choice, taking his place at fullback in a backfield that also included John Unitas of Baltimore at quarterback, Jimmy Orr of Baltimore at flanker and Sayers at halfback.

Dave Parks of San Francisco 49ers, the league's leading pass receiver, was a standout as split end.

In addition to Unitas and Orr, Baltimore placed Jim Parker at guard on the offensive team and corner back Bob Boyd on defense.

**3 PACKERS ON DEFENSE**  
The Packers had only Forrest Gregg at guard on offense, but landed Willie Davis at end, Herb Adderley at corner back and Willie Wood at safety on the defensive unit.

Pete Retzlaff, Philadelphia Eagles' veteran, won the tight end job over Chicago's Mike Ditka and Baltimore's John Mackey.

Cleveland's Eastern Division champions had Dick Schaftrath at offensive tackle in addition to Brown, and the Bears placed corner linebacker Joe Fortunato on the first team along with Sayers and Butkus.

Sayers, who set a league record with 22 touchdowns, edged Timmy Brown of Philadelphia for the halfback position and Butkus, the big home player from Illinois, ousted Red Wittschke of Green Bay from his usual middle linebacker spot.

**12 REPEATERS**  
Of the 22 players on the offensive and defensive teams, only 12 were repeaters.

Centre Mick Tingelhoff of Minnesota Vikings, Unitas, Brown, Parer, Schaftrath and Gregg also made the 1964 offensive club. Tackle Bob Lilly

of Dallas Cowboys safety Paul Krause of Washington Redskins, Fortunato, Davis, Adderley and Wood were back again on defense.

Although Unitas was injured twice during the year and missed the last two games of the regular season after under-

going a leg operation, he was voted the quarterback. The Colts' veteran had 23 touchdown passes, despite the injuries, and his average gain was 8.97 yards.

Coach Vince Lombardi of Green Bay shifted Gregg back to his old tackle post in a late season shuffle of the offensive line, but the veteran made the team at guard, teaming with Parker. Schaftrath's partner at tackle was a new face, Bob Brown of Philadelphia, a second-year man from Nebraska.

The deep defensive combination of Adderley, Boyd, Wood and Krause accounted for a total of 27 interceptions. Dave Jones of Los Angeles Rams, Alex Karras of Detroit Lions, Davis and Lilly, gave the team a great pass rush, and the line-backing trio of Wayne Walker of Detroit and the Chicago pair of Butkus and Fortunato was tough to beat.

**CAHA To Stage Hockey Clinic**

TORONTO (CP) — The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association will stage a national hockey clinic Aug. 19-21 in Montreal under a newly devised format for training amateur coaches and minor league officials.

The clinic will be under the direction of Jack Kennedy, of McMaster University, Hamilton, former hockey coach at Montreal's Loyola College and the University of Toronto.

Also part of the new setup, outlined at a two-day CAHA meeting here last week, is the creation of a travelling hockey instruction clinic to visit main centres throughout Canada. It will begin its work in the 1966-67 hockey season.

Invitations to attend the Montreal clinic will be limited to 100 persons. Each of five regions in Canada will be given a quota on the number of candidates they can send to the clinic.

The new setup replaces the hockey institute plan, inaugurated three years ago. The institute provided instruction at eight-day summer clinics in five regional centres across Canada.

## Ch'town Juvenile All-Stars Drop PVI Pucksters 12-5

Paced by the four goal performance of starry center and team captain Bobby Doherty the Charlottetown Juvenile All-Stars trounced the Provincial Vocational Institute 12-5 in an exhibition fixture played at the Charlottetown Forum last evening.

A fast skating and sharp passing club, the juveniles' prior teamwork began to show up in the final two stanzas and they pulled away from a 3-2 lead at the end of the first stanza to win handily.

Mike MacDonald got the All-Stars scoring parade under way at the 35 second mark of the first period as he slid the puck between goalie John Reed's pads. Ken Squarebriggs knotted the score on a partial break from the left side as his shot caught the far corner but MacDonald put the juveniles ahead to stay at the 9:05 mark as he converted a Dowling pass into a marker. Colin Campbell steered in a rebound to make the score 3-1 but Carl MacQuaid, who played an outstanding game in defeat brought PVI back to within one goal at the 17:13 point.

The All-Stars came out with a vengeance in the second and their four goals in the first half of this stanza left little question of who was to be the eventual victor. Doherty got two, while Dowling and Foley each accounted for one. PVI managed to get two of these back but then Birt

scored at the 19 minute mark and left the All-Stars with a four goal lead.

The third period continued along the same lines as the first two with both clubs playing a wide open brand of hockey. Doherty managed to slam home two more loose pucks and complete his four goal onslaught. Stanby and Newson both racked up tallies for the Stars while MacQuaid made no mistake with his second of the evening for the losers. Paul Stanley also had two goals for the Institute while Ken Squarebriggs recorded the other.

## Baltimore Colts Require No Injuries

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)— Baltimore Colts, who've had fair luck with backup quarterback, hope they won't need their newest one, Bobby Boyd, in a Sunday showdown with Green Bay Packers.

For years, including their National Football League championship campaigns in 1958 and 1959, the Colts got along pretty well with John Unitas calling the plays.

This season they've already used four and coach Don Shula has tabbed Boyd, an all-star defensive back, as No. 5 if anything happens to Tom Matte during Sunday's playoff game for the Western Conference title.

Matte, a veteran halfback who hadn't played quarterback since his college days at Ohio State, slipped into the starting role Saturday and helped steer the crippled Colts to a 20-7 victory over Los Angeles Rams.

Given the job after Unitas and reserve quarterback Gary Coozzo were injured in earlier games and knocked out of action for the rest of the season, Matte used a play guide taped to his wrist and got plenty of sideline help from Shula.

**USED BROWN**  
In that game, Baltimore also got some help from their No. 4 quarterback, Ed Brown, picked up on waivers from Pittsburgh Steelers before game time.

Brown won't be available Sunday against Green Bay because of a league rule against the use of players in conference playoffs unless they were on a team's roster for its last two regular season games.

So in case of injury to Matte, the job will fall to Boyd, who hasn't thrown a game pass since his quarterback days at Oklahoma.

### Bill MacMillan Finds Mark

Horry for the Canadian National club... They finally managed to drop the strong Russian National club after three straight losses and they did it in a much more convincing manner than had previously been accomplished. The Canadians dented the twines six times as opposed to the opponents once. The result of this match can give fans some opportunity to look to the future with a bit more enthusiasm.

Bill MacMillan, leader of the Maritime Intercollegiate scoring race in each of the two years that he attended St. Dunstan's, came up with his first important marker of the current season and it was rather vital in two respects. To begin with the Reds always seem to coast through the first period and then dominate the play throughout the second and third stanzas. However Billy beat them to their punch Monday as he got the Canadians off to a 1-0 lead early in the second stanza, and inspired by this goal the Nationals went on to take a 5-0 lead before the Soviets were able to hit the score sheet. Thus MacMillan tally had a big effect on his squad and they perhaps play their best hockey to date.

MacMillan must have been an elated young man after the game for he has had a difficult row to hoe under the strict coaching of Jack MacLeod. When Billy reported to the National teams training camp MacLeod deemed it advisable that MacMillan alter his style of skating, and this has perhaps been one of the big reasons why MacMillan has been an obscure member of the club up until now.

It would be something like learning to walk again and would, to say it mildly, take a little while to master the rudiments of the new style. MacMillan near the first of the season attributed his poor showing to a lack of confidence but he could be starting to get into high gear. Come to think of it, wouldn't it be rather nice to see a local boy score the goal that brought the world championship back to Canada.

The game was a rugged one and the Reds proved that when necessary they could hit with as much authority as most clubs. An unusual number of infractions were called on both clubs although for once the power play did not play a crucial part in the outcome of the match.

Needless to say the members of the Canadian club were elated over their first triumph against the Soviets. MacLeod, team coach, gleefully pointed out that he did not even have a full roster for the tilt and stated "Get the team together, and let us play together a while and we'll be as good as anybody."

Gary Dindeen, starry member of the roster described the win as the ultimate triumph over "a sort of barrier. We're over it now and if it hadn't have come soon... I don't know what would have happened. But it came we know now that we can do it."

The win was the first ray of hope that Canadian hockey fans have been able to discern and this game just could be the first glimmer of the new dawn of Canadian amateur hockey domination.

### RAMBLINGS...

The traditional hockey rivalry between Queen Charlotte High School and Birchwood will be renewed at the Charlottetown Forum tomorrow evening at 7:00 o'clock as the two teams hit the ice for another thrilling season of competition. The match will be the first game in a two game total point series for the Dows Men's Wear Trophy, put up for competition between the two clubs. Try and plan to be on hand for this first big inter-scholastic encounter of the winter. There is a free skate after the match for those who have paid admission to the game.

David Molson, president of the Montreal Habs announced recently that his club would be willing to meet any international hockey competition providing certain conditions are met. The club president outlined the conditions in a prepared statement. They are:

1. Any team presently a member of the International Ice Hockey Federation must declare itself professional and be openly recognized as such.

2. Any encounter must be played under National Hockey League rules.

3. Financial arrangements satisfactory to the Club de Hockey Canadien would have to be negotiated.

"In terms of an official challenge by any member of the IIHF to the NHL for world hockey supremacy, such teams or team challenging, in addition to adhering to conditions one and two, must first prove themselves, against minor professional opposition.

"This is entirely in their own interest, its purpose being to assist them in achieving standards comparable to the NHL," the statement said.

"In establishing these conditions, I feel that professional hockey is taking a realistic approach to the present situation. Until such time as there is agreement on these conditions, the expansion of professional hockey on a world basis, can never be attained," Mr. Molson said.

### 78 Puck Teams Enter Tourney

QUEBEC (CP) — Seventy-eight hockey teams, including one from Mexico and another from the Northwest Territories, will participate in the seventh annual International pee-wee hockey tournament here Feb. 11-19, it was announced Tuesday.

Gerard Bolduc, president of the tournament, said officials received at least 90 entries but the number of competitors had to be limited to fit the competition dates.

### Bill Veek Gives Views

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP)— Bill Veek, former major league baseball owner, testified Tuesday that expansion of the National League in 1965 is "feasible and possible."

Veek was called as a witness by the State of Wisconsin in support of its civil anti-trust action against the National League and its members, based on the transfer of the Braves from Milwaukee to Atlanta, Ga.

Expansion might reduce the quality of play, Veek said, but would provide better balance and improve competition generally. And it would offer more entertainment for spectators.

"People go to see a contest of equals," said Veek. "They do not have much enjoyment in seeing one team slaughter another."

### Sayers, Brown Leaders

NEW YORK (AP)—Gale Sayers, Chicago Bears' rookie, set a record with 22 touchdowns and led the National Football League in scoring with 182 points in final statistics released Tuesday.

Jim Brown again won the rushing crown—his eighth in nine years—as the Cleveland Browns fullback rolled up 1,544 yards on 289 carries. It was his second-best year, short of his record 1,853 yards in 1963.

Brown also was second in scoring with 21 touchdowns. Both he and Sayers' surpassing Lenny Moore's old mark of 20 set during the 1964 season.
