A MONSTROSITY.—The Farmer says: Among a hatch of chickens at the farm of Mr Arthur C Rogers, a few days ago, there was a remarkable monstrosity. One chick, though perfectly developed in every other way, had three eyes in its head. One was directly in the centre, with another on each side, all perfectly developed. The lower bill, too, was in its right place, but there was no corresponding upper bill. In place of this there was two upper ones which shut on either side of the lower one.

SLIGHT ACCIDENT.—The C. P. R. train for Halifax on Tuesday evening ran into a car at Truro Junction, slightly injuring driver James McCall and fireman McLellan of Moncton. The engine was slightly damaged. The accident resulted from a car being blown on to the main track from the siding by the heavy gale that prevailed in that section. A more serious accident was prevented by the careful lookout kept by the driver and their guard from striking some lumber at Shubenacadie that had also been blown on to the track.

Few people have any idea of the care with which tobacco has to be attended after it is grown. It will imbibe odors of almost any kind if placed near the source of them. A physician, for instance, near the place where the planter stores his crops will impart a disagreeable flavor, which no care afterwards will dissipate it of. A. O. H.—The third biennial convention of the Ancient Order of Foresters of the Province of New Brunswick was held at Woodstock in the early part of the week. The visiting delegates were entertained by the local brethren in grand style. They were treated to drives around the country, entertained at a banquet and a ball, given in their honor. The business meetings were very interesting. There are three divisions of the order in New Brunswick—Woodstock, Fredericton and Milltown. Woodstock has 57 members and \$416 on hand; Fredericton, 82 members, \$310 in funds; Milltown, 35 members and \$278 to its credit.

MORE SHIPMENTS.—The Summerside Journal says: Messrs Deacon and Drummond, Fredericton, shipped twenty two head of fat cattle on Saturday morning to Mr John Macdonald, St. John's. They were an especially fine lot, of good weight, and in excellent condition. They were fed by Hon A Laird, Mr D. H. Macdonald and other well known farmers of Bedeque and vicinity. Mr C. A. Macnutt, Kensington, shipped a fine lot of cattle, twenty two in number, on the St. Lawrence yesterday morning to Messrs J. A. Leman and Co., Halifax.

DAMAGED THE WAGON.—Yesterday afternoon, as two young boys were driving along Kent Street near King Square, a portion of the harness and swing tree became loosened or broken in some way, and the wagon slipped along until the hind legs of the horse would not admit of its going any further ahead. As soon as the horse felt the wagon interfering with his legs he entered a very vigorous protest in the shape of several kicks, which somewhat injured the carriage. The occupants of the carriage fortunately escaped unhurt. A runaway was only prevented by the timely arrival of a man named Hill, who caught the frightened animal and held him just as he was about to get up a rear. The wagon is now laid up for repairs.

PROTECTING THE BOYS.—The Halifax police have received strict instructions to arrest all boys under 16 years of age who are caught smoking or chewing. The law in brief is:

- 1. Any person selling, giving or causing to be sold, any cigars, cigarettes, smoking or chewing tobacco or opium to boys under 16 years of age shall be liable to a fine not greater than \$30 or 30 days. 2. Any man who shall accept any money or other valuable consideration, to act as agent to anybody under 16, in procuring for such person any cigars, etc., shall be fined not greater than \$20 or 30 days. 3. Any person under 16 who has in his possession, or smokes or chews, shall be fined not greater than \$5 or 7 days.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Presbyterian Assembly.

MONTREAL, June 16. In the Presbyterian Assembly, Rev. Jas. Ross, of Perth, has been elected to the new professorship in Montreal College. In the evening the report on Sabbath Observance was presented. Mr. John Charlton, M. P., spoke at length on the principles of Sabbath legislation explaining the provisions of the bill now before parliament. Laird seconded Charlton's motion to adopt report and said Charlton fully deserved the sympathy and support of the church in his efforts to secure legislation on the subject. He emphasized the importance of forbidding publication of Sunday newspapers. The report showed that matters were improving in the Maritime Provinces. Quite a long and breezy discussion followed in which several popular forms of Sabbath desecration got a pretty full airing.

OTTAWA, June 16. Lord HENDER, formerly President of the Probate, Divorce, and Admiralty Division, and Sir John Thompson, have been appointed the representatives of Great Britain on the Behring Sea Arbitration.

The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.)

HALIFAX, June 15.

NOVA SCOTIA.—The cod fishery has been fair to-day at Digby and Spry Bay, but poor at Canoe on account of heavy weather. The schooner Aronia arrived at Lunenburg to-day with 750 qts. cod. She reports fair fair on the banks, while boats at Whitehead average three quarter qts. cod and one hundred herring per mat. A fair catch of herring is reported at Spry Bay. The catch of lobsters is reported light to-day at Spry Bay, Whitehead and Canoe. Hake are good and mackerel fair at Digby and a few mackerel and salmon at Canoe. The catch of mackerel, lobsters, hake and Gaspareaux continue poor at Whitehead.

CAPE BRETON.—Cod good off Lardouise and St. Peter's Island. Fair at Arichat, St. Ann's and Meat Cove, and a few in shore at Lardouise, but owing to the scarcity of bait at English cod fishing is suspended. Lobsters continue fair at Arichat, St. Ann's and Lardouise; and herring fair at Meat Cove, while they are reported good off Lardouise and St. Peter's Island. A few mackerel and salmon at Lardouise and English, respectively, and mackerel and haddock good off Lardouise and St. Peter's Island. All fish continue poor at West Arichat.

P. E. ISLAND.—Cod good at Georgetown and fair at Malpeque. Lobsters fair at Malpeque and a few at Georgetown and Mimmigan.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.—Cod fair and a light catch of haddock and lobsters.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—Lobsters and salmon poor at Point Esquinac.

QUEBEC.—Cod fishing good at Paspébiac, St. Marguerite River and Moisie, and fair at Grand River and Seven Islands. Herring continue scarce at Paspébiac and Grand River, but caplin are very plentiful at Grand River and St. Marguerite River, and a few at Paspébiac. Salmon fishing is good at St. Marguerite River and Moisie, but poor at Goups. The lobster factory at Grand River closed yesterday for the season.

ANTICOST.—Cod are very plentiful at English and Fox Bay, but bait is very scarce. Fair catches of caplin and a few herring are being taken at the former place.

BAIT AND ICE.—Herring bait procurable at Arichat, C. B.

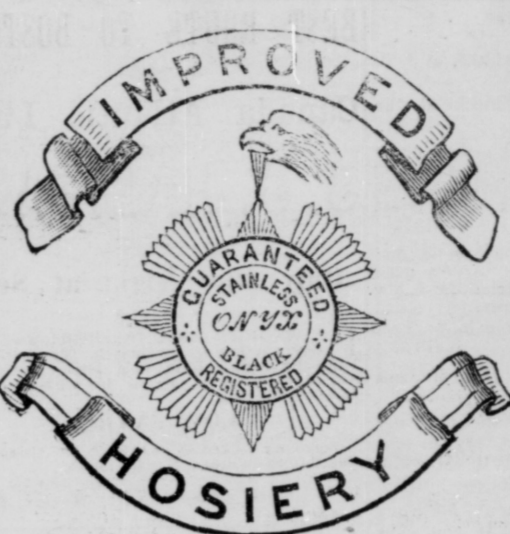
