Geo'town Eagles Score Second Straight Victory Montague In 7-4 Win

The Georgetown Eagles handed out a second straight defeat to the Montague Meteors last night at Georgetown by the score of 7-4. The win last night puts Georgetown well in the lead in the King's County Hockey League with eight points and Montague and Souris two each. Georgetown has played five games, lost one; Montague three games, lost two.

Playing the new puck icing rule, the two teams forced several whistles in the first period, but as the game progressed and they became more familiar with the rule, puck icing whistles were few. It was a hard fought game with roughing and close checking, both teams passed out severe body checks to opposing linesmen. The first period was marked by considerable boarding and hooking, but as the referees called the penalties this dropped off in the last two periods. The Meteors in the first period, and the fast Georgetown team took advantage of this to shoot in four tallies without a comeback from the Meteors. Things evened up during the second session when the Meteors got the feel of the ice and went on the offensive to split a brace of goals with the Eagles. In the last period, the Meteors out-shot the Eagles, scoring three tallies to Georgetown's two.

The Eagles looked good as they carried a pressing attack to the Meteor zone and their fast forwards gave the Montague defence-men all they were able to handle. The Meteors, on their part, were not slow to return the attack particularly in the last two periods, and although in scoring position several times failed to make the tally. It was the type of game to please the large crowd of fans who saw fast hockey on hard ice, close checking and the usual crowd pleasing roughing.

Annual Meeting Of Souris Bd. of Trade

Mr. Bruce L. Stewart was elected president of the Souris Board of Trade at the annual meeting held in the Town Hall yesterday afternoon. He succeeds Mr. William A. Wright. Other officers named were vice-president A.T. MacDonald and secretary treasurer J.H. Brennan.

The Board devoted considerable discussion to the matter of the way the sea is cutting into the sand bank at Souris Beach and thus endangering the main highway. Another item of general importance to members present was the proposed hard surfacing of the road from Souris to Elmira and to the railway wharf at Souris.

Mr. W. A. Wright, president presided at the meeting and the minutes of the last annual meeting, as well as the financial statement, were read by secretary Mr. Charles Boylan. Mr. Wright reviewed the work of the Board during the past year especially in connection with "Clean Up Week," the electric rate increase, the increase in telephone rates, the reconstruction and improvement of the railway wharf and the housing of the employees required in the coming year for the fresh fish filleting plant.

The president also stated they had received an acknowledgment of receipt of the resolution passed by the Board of Trade at its January 16 meeting protesting the discontinuance of the mail truck service. However, there was no discussion of the matter yesterday pending a reply to the resolution.
