THE LION AND THE BEAR.

England and Russia in Agreement

AND THE OTHER NATIONS LOOKING SOURLY ON.

The Americans are Thought to Have Cut Themselves Off.

LONDON, May 1.—Pending detailed information the London papers comment approvingly but cautiously upon the news of the Anglo-Russian agreement regarding the spheres of influence in China.

The Daily Chronicle points out that this agreement will produce similar arrangements with Germany and France resulting in the protection of China, which Lord Chas. Beresford predicts will bring about war.

America, says the Chronicle, will apparently be left out in the cold, and she needs no sympathy, for had she been willing to join us at an earlier stage in keeping China open to the world the present situation would never have been brought about.

PARIS, May 1.—French papers comment acidly upon the Anglo-Russian agreement.

La Libérale says there are millions of French capital embarked in the commercial and industrial undertakings in the Yangtze region, and we refuse to believe that Russia has so completely disregarded the interests of her ally as to recognize Great Britain's sole right of commercial exploitation in the valley.

Little Differences.

OTTAWA, April 23.—The Ottawa Reform Association is rent with internal dissensions. At the annual meeting several of the old time liberals were noticeably absent. There is much feeling over the official letter-head, which bears on the corner of every sheet the following significant remark:—

"To Liberal member."
"Members of the government whose social affiliations are conservative must learn to lay their social friendships aside when considering appointments to office. If they do not, the Liberal party may demand that they give place to those who will."
This paragraph, it is claimed, is not only a threat against the members, but an insult, especially when the letter on which it is written carries a request for patronage. There is some talk of forming a new liberal association.

RIOTING IN IOWA

Man Killed, Many Wounded, Property Destroyed.

WARDNER, IOWA, May 1.—Wardner has been the scene of the worst riots since the deadly labor war of 1892.

One man is dead and another thought to be mortally wounded, and property valued at a quarter of a million of dollars has been destroyed by giant powder and fire.

The damage was done by union miners and a mob of sympathizers, who came down from Canyon Creek all armed and many masked, who seized the train at Burke and brought with them 3000 pounds of giant powder.

BAD RAILWAY ACCIDENT

Excursion Train Leaves Track—People Killed and Injured.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., May 1.—A disastrous railroad wreck occurred on the Rochester and Lake Ontario railroad at Rosenbaum's Corners.

Two cars on an excursion train filled with passengers left the track while going round a curve at full speed and were completely wrecked.

Over 50 passengers were injured. Three are dead and at least a dozen are fatally injured.

A NEW FORGERY.

Caster's the Dreyfus Case Causes It continuation.

PARIS, April 28.—A great sensation has followed the publication by the Figaro of the supplemental deposition made before the United Chamber of the Court of Cassation by M. Paleologue, one of the permanent officials in the Foreign Office, whose evidence establishes a new forgery.

The Soir, an anti-Dreyfusite organ, violently attacks the Minister for Foreign Affairs, M. Delcasse, under whose orders M. Paleologue's second deposition was made. It charges M. Delcasse with giving the Figaro evidence of the Court, particularly that of M. Paleologue, declaring that "nobody else could have had any interest in making it public."

The Temps announces tomorrow that the Court of Cassation has applied to the Minister for the Colonies to deliver the document which was found in French Guiana in 1897 among other Dreyfusite documents, and sent to the Colonial Office with the strictest precautions. It is alleged this document absolutely proves the innocence of Dreyfus.

The Transvaal Again.

CAPE TOWN, April 28.—There is renewed uneasiness over the situation in the Transvaal. President Kruger's general-in-chief, Joubert, is inspecting the frontiers, and selecting places suitable for entrenchments.

More rigid inspection of the military has also been ordered. Kruger, as he intimated a month ago, evidently is expecting hostilities with England.

The Dutchmen are uneasy over the result of the petition to Joseph Chamberlain, England's minister, signed by 21,000 English residents of the Transvaal, and setting forth their grievances. Chamberlain's action, it is believed, will mark a crisis in English-Dutch relations. The British army here is being steadily augmented.

Deidrich's Defied Dewey.

BERLIN, April 28.—A despatch from Kiel to the Vossische Zeitung says that naval officers there are smiling at the statements by Captain Joseph B. Coghlan in the course of his speech at the Union League club banquet in New York last week. These officers claim that Admiral Deidrich's answer to Admiral Dewey's threat was simply: "Clear action and quietly steam through the American lines into the harbor."

Wireless Telegraphy.

LONDON, April 28.—Wireless telegraphy had its first practical demonstration this morning. The Goodwin Sands lightship was struck by a passing vessel and the crew, utilizing the wireless telegraphy apparatus, notified South Foreland that their ship was in a sinking condition. They were thereupon despatched to the assistance of the lightship.
