Halved Grapefruit with Cranberry Sauce Garnish

Egg Toast with Orange Sections
And Almonds

1 1/2 c. fresh or drained refrigerated orange sections
2 c. honey of sugar
4 eggs
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 1/2 c. whole or skim milk
1/2 c. 1 stick butter or margarine

12 slices white bread, dehydrated and halved
2 c. toasted blanched, halved almonds
Combine orange sections and honey and sugar. Let stand 10 min. a room temperature to become thick.
In a shallow bowl, beat eggs with salt and cinnamon; stir in milk, making an egg batter.
Heat large skillet or square griddle. Brush with butter.
Dip each bread slice quickly in and out of egg batter; drain a second or so, then fry on both sides in butter.
Keep warm in oven.

Do not pile up slices; instead, place in buttered large pan. To serve, spoon over orange sections and juice. Garnish: almonds.

NOTE: This toast is especially good made from white 1 1/2 inch bread, sliced 1/2 inch thick. Leave on crust. Before frying, let bread stand in egg batter a few seconds, then fry to moisten both sides.

DATE CREAM SCONES
1 1/2 c. patted fresh California dates
2 1/2 c. butter or margarine
1 c. biscuit mix
1/2 c. half n' half
1 tsp. butter or margarine
1 tsp. sugar
1 tsp. grated orange rind
1 tsp. melted butter or margarine (optional)

Slice dates. Chop 2 tsp. of butter into biscuit mix well distributed. Mix in half n' half. Roll into a circle about 9 inches in diameter.

Roll the one tsp. butter. Combine with dates, sugar and orange rind. Spoon evenly over rolled dough. Cut into 9 pie-shaped pieces.

Starting from outside edge, roll each piece up to a point and blend into crescent shape.

Queen Elizabeth's Official Visits In 1965 Will Be Affected By International Politics

LONDON (CP) — The uncertain world of international politics, which until recently hardly touched the steady round of royal activities, will affect two of the Queen's major engagements in 1965.

One of them, the long-expected state visit to West Germany in May, is likely to prove as much discussion—even controversy, for different reasons—as the Queen's tense trip to Quebec last October.

It will be the first state visit of a British sovereign to Germany since Edward VII visited his nephew Kaiser Wilhelm II in 1909.

In the 56 years since the outbreak of the First World War, Anglo-German relations have varied from open hostility to a lingering suspicion that occurs

tionally still erupts in sections of the British press and public opinion. The 1965 tour will probably be seen as a momentous watershed; the final recognition 20 years to the monarchy of the Nazi surrender, that the two countries have buried the past.

But there will be controversy. The key to it is Berlin. Germans apparently hope and expect the Queen to visit West Berlin, their "front-line" half-city set like an island in the hostile sea of Communist East Germany. There are thorny diplomatic hazards here and the British foreign office says no arrangements will be announced until just before the royal tour starts May 18, in case of any fresh crisis in the divided city.

DELICATE PROBLEM
The East Germans and the Soviet Union might interpret a visit by the Queen as implying Britain recognizes West Berlin as part of the Federal Republic of Germany. Britain's attitude is that the city is a four-power responsibility.

A possible way around this objection would be to announce the Queen was visiting British troops in West Berlin.

There is also the question of her safety flying through the air corridors, which the Communists have repeatedly stated would be used only for supplying Western troops in the city. However, they have permitted normal commercial traffic provided the planes touch down first at West German airports.

It is also expected to last a week or 10 days. Plans for it were made as far back as 1952 when West German President Theodor Heuss came to London as a state visit. It is customary for the Queen to pay a return call on a visiting head of state.

In 1963 she has also been affected by political developments; in this case, the ousting in November of President Bourghis Abboud, who publicly invited the Queen to his country on his state visit to London last May.
