Dr. L. H. Killora has opened an office for the practice of medicine at 84 Great George Street in Charlottetown.

Dr. Killora is the son of Mr. J. L. Killora and the late Mrs. Killora of Saint John, New Brunswick. He received his primary education at St. Vincent's High School in Saint John, where he graduated in 1941 as leader of his class and valedictorian. He received the degree of Bachelor of Science, magna cum laude, at St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, Nova Scotia in 1945 and was awarded the Governor-General's silver medal for highest aggregate in his three years at college. He also won the proficiency prize in pre-medical science. In his senior year he was president of the Pre-Medical Society. He was a member of the 1949 graduating class in the faculty of medicine at McGill University.

After a year of internship in Windsor, Ontario, Dr. Killora spent one year in general practice in McAdam, New Brunswick. In July 1951 he accepted a three-year appointment as surgical resident from Beckley Hospital, West Virginia, during which time he was granted an affiliation in thoracic surgery at the West Virginia Sanatorium. In July of 1954 he received his diploma in general surgery from Beckley Hospital. ## Wood Islands Ferry Traffic Figures For Aug.

Traffic figures released for the month of August by Northumberland Ferries Limited show an increase of 474 trucks over the same period last year. Passengers and autos ferried showed decreases. The figures are (last year in brackets) Trucks 1141 (798), Autos 5371 (5893), Passengers 21,017 (21,234). Cumulative figures for the period May-August show an increase in trucks of 596 the totals being 3795 (3299), autos decrease by 77 to 15,835 (15,912) and passengers carried increased by 1,246 to 58,428 from (57,182).

Mr. R.E. Mutch, President of the Company called attention to the demand for space for truck transport carrying both regular and perishable freight, had disrupted auto and passenger traffic to a great extent during the last month than ever before.

The number of units carried during past month was 1141 against 798 in 1954 but this does not tell the whole story, because the carrying capacity of the trucks is now much greater. "We are confident that the total carried in August than the total carried by the 629 trucks transported during the full season in 1954, and we are confident that the increased tonnage this year over 1954 is at least 40 per cent greater than in August 1954."

"Passenger and auto traffic was therefore disrupted because traffic will not tolerate such delay as is imposed by the trucks, which drivers will line up on the pier overnight, sleeping in the truck, if no other accommodation is available, and take their turn to get space, and this condition we are sure will continue until such time as the new boat is available."

## Find Remains Of Ice-Age Horse

REGINA (CP) — Remains of a rare ice-age horse which roamed North America 10,000 years ago have been found in a gravel pit near Fort Qu'Appelle, 50 miles northeast of Regina.

Bruce McCordquaine, paleontologist at the provincial museum of natural history, said today that from the same gravel pit also came the teeth and portion of a tusk of a woolly mammoth, and what appears to be part of the skull of a musk ox.

He explained that a modern type of horse evolved on this continent 5,000 years ago and migrated to Asia. Those horses that strayed behind were wiped out during the ice age. It was not until the 14th century that Spanish explorers re-introduced the horse to North America.

## Vancouver Police Probe Is Adjourned

By BRUCE LEVETT Canadian Press Staff Writer VANCOUVER (CP) — The oft-adjourned Tupper royal commission into Vancouver police affairs Friday was put off for a week amid reports that its activities have forced Vancouver gamblers into hiding.

Next Thursday it will sit in city council chambers of city hall, the same chambers used in 1947 for a police inquiry which ended with 19 officers dismissed and six demoted.

Chief Water Mulligan, son of a Liverpool policeman, will again be a central figure in the oak-paneled room but playing a different role than he did eight years ago.

Then, as a detective-sergeant, he told of corrupt practices within the force. As a result, he was promoted to detective superintendent, then to chief constable at the age of 42.

Also, he said, his own counsel is awaiting "RCMP reports on work done" since the sittings began in mid-July.

A special squad of RCMP officers has been investigating the criminal aspects surrounding evidence given during the lengthy hearings, with a view to possible criminal charges.

A court official said Friday a list of bookmakers, read out late last month during proceedings, forced Vancouver gamblers underground, complicating the work of the RCMP team.

## Alley Cat Causes Man To Lose Life

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—An alley cat bit the thigh and arm of Ira H. Kidd, 55, a tugboat captain, last life Friday.

Curiosity as to the cat's color led to his death.

He was driving a friend, W. A. Danley to Danley's home when the cat crossed the street in front of the car.

"That was a black cat," Kidd said to Danley.

"No, Ira," Danley dissented, "it was red."

The two men argued briefly. Suddenly, Kidd braked the car to a stop, went into reverse. "We'll see what color it was," he said.

He never did.

The car smashed into a concrete street marker. Kidd was thrown out. As he fell the sharp bottom of the car door slashed his chest, exposing his heart. He was dead within minutes.

Sgt. R. D. Brown, accident investigator, arrived and saw an alley cat slither out of a nearby ditch. The cat was black and white.

## Little Interest In Biscuit Stock

LONDON (CP) — Shareholders have picked up only three per cent of a new £5,000,000 stock issue offered by Toronto biscuit king Garfield Weston in his allied bakeries business.

Weston said that £3 of every £100 worth of the loan shares, which carry five per cent interest, Weston wants the money to continue an expansion plan involving purchase of additional retail bakery outlets.

On Aug. 12 Allied Bakeries offered their shareholders the new loan stock, thought to be attractive in the then prevailing market conditions. But London stock market conditions have deteriorated appreciably as a result of the British government's current credit squeeze policy and this accounts for the failure of the public to show an interest in the offer.

The issue was underwritten, so Allied Bakeries will get the money they were asking for. But the underwriters—the London and Yorkshire Trust—find themselves saddled with £4,850,000 worth of it.

## In the Best Interests of the Potato

It is desirable to have the friction of the last few years resolved in some way. "The potato industry is so essential to the economy of the Province that no one person or group should be permitted to spoil our markets. The Government is very conscious of the necessity to continue to control potato diseases in the Province. To this end a recommendation will be made at the legislature at its next session to provide a substantial sum of money for disease control which will be repaid by future levies. If the Potato Board functions amicably this money could be placed under the control and management of the Board.

"The Government is also very anxious to see that proper marketing and inspection policies are followed at all times. "The amendment to the Potato Marketing Scheme which was published in the Royal Gazette on June 4th, 1955, was passed by the Government in an attempt to see that growers and suppliers of commodities to growers could enter into contracts without interference from others not party to the contract.

"I would like to point out that the Government never prevented the collection of outstanding license fees. My request was that the collection be held in abeyance until such time as the Board could formulate a policy which might avoid dissatisfaction and court actions. "The Government is of the opinion that there should be no interference with any individual or group of individuals on any agreement with the Board of Transport Commissioners relative to agreed charges. Simple questions like this should be resolved without Government interference or court actions. The Government will certainly lend its efforts and support to an application to obtain a Marketing Agreement with the Government of Canada under the Co-operative Marketing Act.

"Your truly, "Premier and Attorney General, On August 4, Mr. MacDonald was asked to meet the Premier and in the discussion that ensued the Board Chairman was asked to outline some of his proposals which he thought necessary if the Board were to remain an effective organization. "He told me that the market was still in the potato marketing Board since it was formed in 1950. Mr. MacDonald said that he deeply appreciated the measure of public support that had been afforded him during the past five years. He expressed special thanks to Mr. MacNeill and Mr. Wright for their loyal support at all times. He also expressed his thanks to Messrs. Richard MacPhee, New Haven, Donald MacLeod, Victoria Cross and Irving Hogg, Wilmet Cross, who had become members of the Board within the past two years. "Their efforts on behalf of the potato industry were honest and sincere at all times," said Mr. MacDonald. Mr. MacDonald said that he was grateful for the co-operation of Dominion officials of the Department of Agriculture such as Mr. Gardner, Mr. Taggart, Mr. Shaw, Mr. Turner and Mr. Konge who he said had given the former marketing board their full support at all times.
