Political News.

Elected by Acclamation.

Five Conservatives and Three Grits.

Only Conservatives Running in Six Districts.

So that the Government has Eleven Supporters, or a Majority of Eight at the Start.

TORONTO, Feb. 27.

There were eight elections by acclamation to-day from each side. Jonas, of Gaspe; Laviviere, of Provencher; Tyrwhit, of South Simcoe; Mara, of Yale; Gordon, of Nanaimo, all Conservatives. The Oppositionists were Renfret, Laurier, and Vallancourt.

Only Conservatives were nominated in Restigouche, Gloucester, Carleton (Ont.), South Leeds, Alberta, and Montcalm, making really eleven Conservatives to three Liberals elected.

There are no constituencies in which only Liberals are running.

DISGRACEFUL SCENE IN ST. JOHN.

Bright Prospects in all the Provinces!

Government Majority Estimated at 45.

ST. JOHN, Feb. 27.

The scene in St. John was lively, as a mob tried to howl down Skinner and McLeod, but without avail.

Reports from all the Provinces show that the Conservatives will carry every Province from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The Government majority in next parliament cannot be less than forty-five. The stampede of Liberals shows up in strong colors on today's nomination papers.

W. N. Fullerton, of Amherst, died suddenly in St. John to-day in the Lunatic Asylum. He was at one time a leading citizen of Amherst.

The reports from Nova Scotia are of a most cheering character. The grits now realize that they will lose largely in the Maritime Provinces.

HEAVY ODDS OFFERED

That the Government will be Sustained.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.

Six candidates were nominated here, three of whom will certainly lose their deposit.

One strong indication of popular feeling as to the result of the election is the fact that bets are a hundred to one on the Government being sustained, and even these odds cannot find acceptance. The only debatable ground is the size of the majority.

American Competition.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 27.

Two caravans of horses arrived at Emerson, Manitoba, this week from Illinois. They are laid down at twenty per cent lower than Canadian horses could be purchased for. More caravans are on the way.

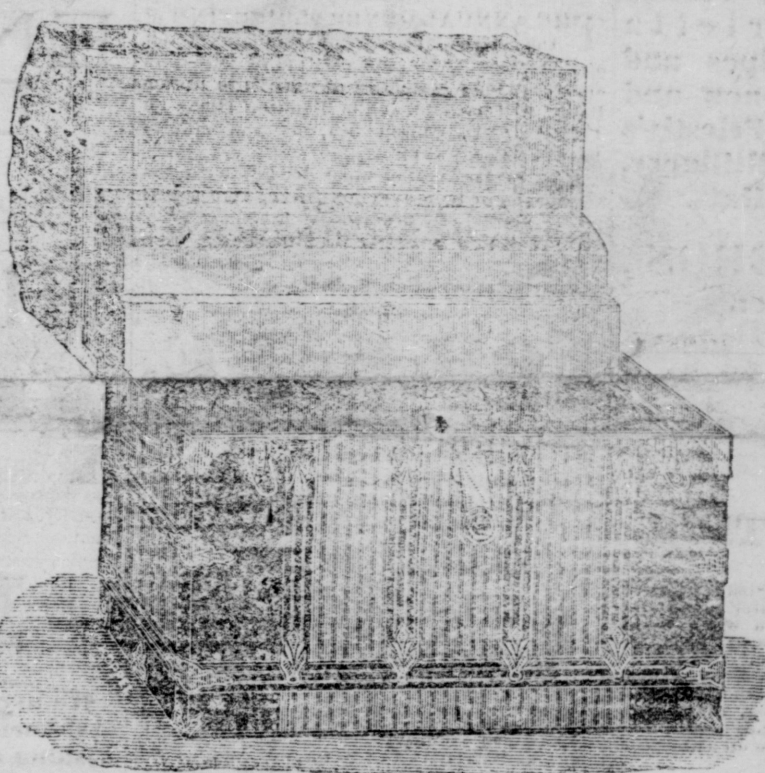
