Jail Sentence, Fine Are Result Of Theft

In Queens County Magistrate's Court, two residents of Marshfield pleaded guilty to charges of theft when arraigned before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., Friday afternoon.

The two were specifically charged with having stolen one car battery, one five-gallon can, and a quantity of gasoline from a boat, at or near Covehead, the property of George Bell.

For this offence one was sentenced to 30 days in Queens County Jail and the other drew a fine of \$25 and costs or 30 days.

Arraigned on two charges a North Rustico man pleaded guilty to the charge of creating a disturbance in a public place by swearing, and not guilty to a second charge of assault causing bodily harm.

The accused was given a fine of \$15 and costs or ten days. Previously convicted on a charge of indecent assault, a Central Rustico youth appeared Friday for sentence.

The Magistrate stated that due to the age of the accused and the extenuating circumstances, a two-year, suspended sentence was imposed. In addition the accused was ordered to enter into a recognizance in the amount of \$500.

A Freetown youth who had previously entered a plea of guilty to a charge of breaking and entering a residence and stealing a quantity of clothing, appearing yesterday requested that he be permitted to change his plea to that of not guilty.

This being accepted the accused was further remanded until Friday, July 3rd.

A resident of East Rustico convicted for having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence, drew a fine of \$200 and costs or two months in jail, after it was dis-

closed by the crown that it was his second conviction on an offence of this nature.

Two others, one from Beaton's Mills and the other from Bonshaw, both pleaded guilty to charges of possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their residence, were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

An appeal was also granted to Vincent L. Pineau, who was previously sentenced to 30 days on a charge of assaulting a police officer in the execution of his duty.

2 Decisions Of Magistrate Reversed By Appeal Court

Five appeal cases were completed in Supreme Court at Charlottetown yesterday. The sessions were presided over by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, with Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGilligan and Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy, also on the bench.

3 Ministers At Field Day

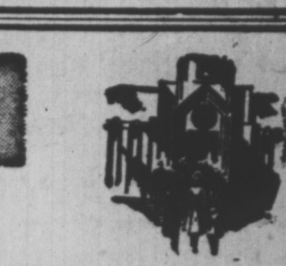
