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Dredge Prepares To Leave Montague For Job At Souris

Yesterday the Dredge 115 was brought to the wharf at Montague to dismantle in preparation for moving to Souris, where it will continue work for a few days before leaving for winter quarters.

It is expected that the dredge will leave shortly, either Saturday or early next week, and will be accompanied by the tow-boats, Pugwash and Canso. It is not yet known in what particular spot the dredge will work while in Souris. It is understood that the tug Glen Libet II will remain in Georgetown to attend Dredge Number 14.

The 115 started work at Montague on July 8th, and has completed the first course and a considerable portion of the second course. Altogether about 120,000 cubic yards have been moved during the four months in which the dredge has been in operation.

Only the captains of the vessels and the exporters will have a full realization of the great benefit which this work means to this district. Ships of larger tonnage will be able to come in to this port, with the consequence of a larger amount of produce being exported.

The amount of work needed to clear the channel is so great, because of the enormous silt filling, that another year will be required to finish the job. It is hoped that the 115 will return again next year to complete the excellent work which it has been doing during the past four months.

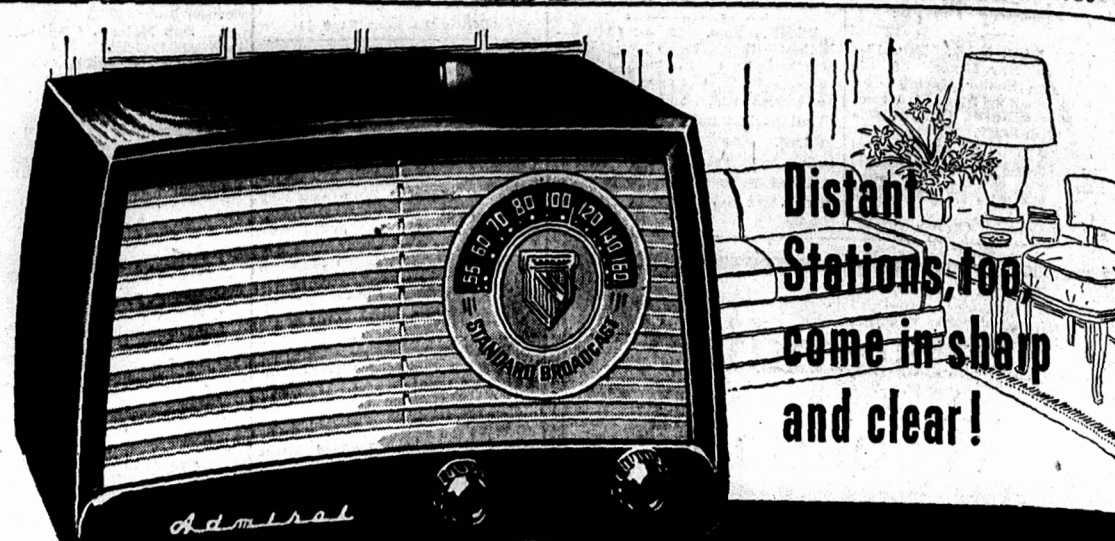
