WINNIPEG, Sept. 23. The Battleford Herald contains particulars of some sixty Indians leaving Poundmaker's reserve and going, it is said, in the direction of Edmonton, because they were refused food as punishment for misdemeanors. Indian officials had started in pursuit. The Indians had no arms and could not hunt, and it is supposed hunger will drive them back.

Fatal Accident.

HALIFAX, Sept. 23. While Major Wells, of the Royal Engineers, was driving his fiancee, a daughter of T. E. Kenny, Esq., from a wedding last evening, he collided with the team of Mr. Mullally, and Mrs. Mullally and Miss Kenny were thrown out. The former fell on her head and died this morning of the injury received. She was 47 years of age.

Newfoundland News.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Sept. 23. In a terrific northwest gale, on Tuesday last, a Newfoundland fishing vessel collapsed in Trepassy Bay. Fortunately, but one life was lost. The most serious apprehensions are entertained for the safety of late fishing vessels of the Grand Bank fleet. The Labrador herring fishery is an absolute failure.

A Challenge.

GLASGOW, Sept. 23. Clyde yachting circles are excited over the challenge issued by James Bell, of the Royal Yacht Club to the New Yacht Club for an international race for the America's cup next Sept. A boat will be especially constructed for the match by the Clyde Club. £10,000 have already been subscribed.

DUBLIN, Sept. 23. Rev. Wood Lock, D. D., Roman Catholic Bishop of the diocese of Orghall and Clonmacnoise, Ireland, has issued an address to his people, asking them to discourage the formation of secret societies, and to live in a lawful manner. He says this is for the welfare of Ireland.

Disaster at Sea.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 23. A vessel, bottom up, sheathed with yellow metal, and about 250 feet of keel, was passed on 19th, in lat. 34.06, lon. 65.10. A number of logs and a quantity of spars, apparently attached to the vessel, were floating about.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23. Nothing can be learned at the State Department, respecting the new commercial treaty with Great Britain described in Ottawa despatches. It is neither denied nor admitted that such a treaty is in progress.

Cricket.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 23. The first of the two great international cricket matches, between English gentlemen and Philadelphia gentlemen, was commenced this morning. At latest accounts the English team seemed to be winning.

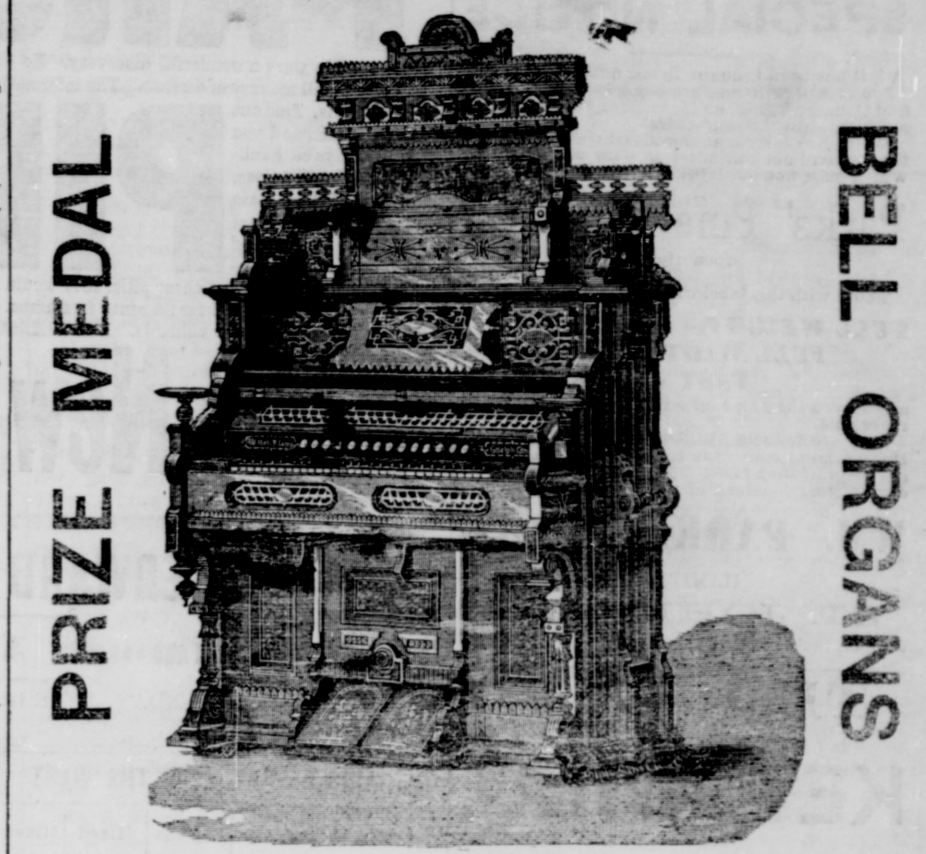
