Trade With Newfoundland Restored.

OTTAWA, May 27.

It is expected that the proclamation will be issued to-day in Newfoundland and in Canada, which will restore the trade of the two countries to the old basis.

Two men living at Red Head went out to look after lobster traps. Their boat was afterwards found bottom up and it is now known that both men were drowned. Their names are Bean and Hanlan.

The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.)

HALIFAX, May 26.

Nova Scotia.—Cod plentiful at Spry Bay and bankers at Canso report cod in abundance at Bird Rocks, Magdalen. Good takes were made to-day at Port Medway and Lunenburg. Herring abundant at Lunenburg, as well as gasperaux and salmon at Port Medway. Mackerel are good at Lunenburg, and boats at Liverpool average 100, while a few are being taken at Spry Bay. Light catches of lobsters are reported at Liverpool, Port Medway and Spry Bay.

Cape Breton.—Fair catches of cod and a few herring at St. Ann's and Margaree, while the catch of cod is light at Ingonish and the same of herring at Lardiose, Louisburg, Ingonish and Mabou and Port Hood. Lobsters are good at Margaree, fair at St. Ann's, Mabou and Port Hood, but poor at St. Peter's and Ingonish. Light catches of mackerel reported at St. Peter's and Lardiose, and a few gasperaux at Louisburg, Ingonish and Port Hood.

P. E. Island.—Lobsters very plentiful at Waterford, Frog Pond and North Cape. Good at Georgetown and fair at Tignish, Aliberton, Kildare and Goose Harbor. At Malpeque boats are averaging 700. Herring reported schooling off Cape North and good catches at Miminigash, West Shore, Tignish, Kildare and Aliberton, and a few at Georgetown. Cod good at Georgetown and fair at Malpeque.

Magdalen Islands.—Lobsters fair and a few cod and herring.

New Brunswick.—Herring and lobsters fair at Caraquet.

Quebec.—Herring and lobsters fair at Gaspe.

Anticosti.—Light catches of lobsters at West Point and herring striking in at Fox Bay.

Bait.—Bankers can procure an abundance of bait at Lunenburg and ice at Georgetown.

P. E. Island Hospital.

The annual general meeting of the subscribers to the Prince Edward Island Hospital was held last evening in the waiting room of the institution. Besides the President, Secretary and trustees of the institution, there was a good attendance of other friends and supporters of the hospital. The reports of the President and of the Ladies Aid Society were read. These reports show the character of the work performed and the financial condition of the institution. The total receipts for the year footed up \$4,794.09, and the expenditure (including a balance of \$531 against the hospital) amounts to \$3,008.47, leaving the snug sum of \$1,785.62 on hand. A good part of this sum is to be expended for further improvements such as electric lights, a special ward for infectious diseases, etc. The two trustees—A. B. Mackenzie and Archibald Kennedy—going out by lapse of time, the first-mentioned gentleman was re-elected and Alexander McKinnon was elected in the place of Mr. Kennedy. Votes of thanks were tendered the ladies who so kindly helped along the institution during the year, and the medical staff for their gratuitous services. During the evening remarks were made by Messrs. F. L. Hazard, A. B. Warburton, L. L. Beer, A. Kennedy, Dr. Johnson and others.
